GRANT PETITION THEN RESCIND

Finding that it had violated its custom in granting privilege to connect with the sewer at the intersection of California and Monroe Sts. to a number of petitioners who reside outside the city limits, at a charge of only \$5 for each terminal, on Tuesday evening, the city council met in special session Wednesday afternoon and rescinded the action. The petition was signed by F. N. Bryant, F. J. Osterman, E. H. Duffy, F. M. Handy and W. C. Kruegel, and Councilman Kruegel himself requested that the special meeting be called when he discovered that in similar cases on previous occasions the property owners outside the limits had been required to pay in proportion to the payments of the owners of property inside the limits. The petitioners will be permitted to make the connection, but will be required to pay their percentage of the original cost of the sewer system.

LESSER COUNCIL DOINGS

T. C. Martin was granted permission by the council to make use of one-half of Grand street, from Main to Olson, for his big auction sale and barbecue Saturday.

O. W. Dixon was granted permission to build a brick addition, 14x26 feet, with rubberized roof, in the rear of the building recently vacated by the Nasberg jewelry store. The building will be used as a bakery.

M. J. Chapman was granted permission to substitute a steel mill board for the frame board now in place near the north line of Paradise street.

The petition of Dr. M. J. Beistel for a refund of the amount of the assessment for the cement sidewalk abutting his property on Maiden Lane was referred to the sidewalk committee. The petitioner asked the refund on the ground that a good cement sidewalk was removed to make place for the new one and that he should not be required to pay for the change.

The street committee advised the purchase of patching apparatus for repairing the city streets. The report was referred to the purchasing committee.

The petition of Mrs. M. F. Gannon and H. H. Curtiss for the vacation by the city of property on Pine street was referred to the street and highway committee.


