UNIVERSITY WINS WOMEN'S DEBATE

Teams Defeat Both Washington State and Whitman Co-eds in Triangular Contest

In the women's triangular debate between Washington State, Whitman and the University of Washington, the University won from W. S. C. at Pullman and from Whitman at Seattle, thus winning the triangular. Whitman won from W. S. C. at Walla Walla. In both cases the local teams lost by a two to one decision.

In the home debate the college was represented by Lucile Davis and Miss Williams. The University of Washington was represented by Dorothy Hess and Ruth Tewinkle. The judges of the debate were President McKay of Whitworth College, Dean Ayres of the University of Idaho and Dean Shattuck of the University of Idaho. Dean Rhoda M. White of W. S. C. acted as chairman.

The team at Walla Walla was composed of Lora Maxwell and Ellen Keyes. Whitman was represented by Rosella Hamilton and Alma Smith. The judges were R. G. Hargreaves, principal of North Central high school of Spokane, John H. Dietrich of Spokane and Professor E. F. Hulme of the University of Idaho. Miss Leona Klahr of Walla Walla high school presided.

The question used in all the debates was: "Resolved that the La Follette seamen's act should be repealed." In the home debate W. S. C. upheld the affirmative, while at Walla Walla W. S. C. upheld the negative.

FINAL ART EXHIBIT WILL BE GREATEST OF YEAR

Another exhibition of paintings, the last of the season, and judged to be the best to be secured by the Twentieth Century club for the college, will be seen here about the end of April.

This exhibition was on its way east from the San Diego exposition and the Twentieth Century club managed to have it sent via Pullman.

At present the paintings are being shown at the Art Museum in Portland, where they have attracted much attention. The Oregonian has this to say of the exhibition:

"Brilliant colors, daringly applied, are noted in the exhibition at the Portland Art Museum, which opened early last week and will continue until April 24—Easter Monday.

"The pictures shown in the collection are excellent and interesting examples of the modern movement in art. They are vivid, colorful and pleasing. But they aren't extreme. Even the uninitiated can appreciate them and will not need an explanation of what he sees.

"This exhibit was shown at the San Diego exposition and is now on its way to its home in the east. The painters are all New York men of the modern school, nearly all of them being comparatively young. Some were pupils of Robert Henri, one of the best-known men of the present day art world.

RESOLUTION No. 319

Be It Resolved by the City Council of the City of Pullman, Washington:

1. That it is the intention of the City Council, and it hereby declares its intention to improve the following described streets: Beginning on Grand street at the south line of McKenzie street thence southwesterly along Grand street to a point on the extension of the property line between lots 3 and 4, block 11, Garden City addition, by filling, grading and paving the same and doing such other work as may be necessary in connection therewith, all in accordance with plans and specifications to be prepared by the City Engineer.

2. That all persons who may desire to object thereto are hereby notified to appear and present such objections at a meeting of the City Council to be held in the Council Chamber in the City Hall in the City of Pullman, Washington, at 8:00 o'clock p. m., on the 16th day of May, 1916, which time and place is hereby fixed for hearing all matters relating to said improvement, and all objections thereto, and for determining the method of payment for said improvement.

3. That the City Engineer is hereby instructed to submit to the Council on or before the 16th day of May, 1916, an estimate of the cost and the expense of the improvement herein contemplated, together with the statement of the proportionate amount thereof which should be borne by the property within the proposed assessment district, together with a statement of the aggregate valuation of the real estate exclusive of improvements within said district, according to the valuation last placed upon it, for the purposes of general taxation, together with a diagram or print showing thereon the lots, tracts or parcels of land and other property which will be especially benefited by said improvement, together with his estimate of the amount of the cost and expense of said improvement which should be borne by each lot, tract or parcel of land or other property.

4. Be it further Resolved: That the City Clerk shall cause this resolution to be published for two consecutive issues of The Pullman Herald, the official newspaper of the City of Pullman. The first publication to be at least 15 days before the 16th day of May, 1916.

5. That the cost and expense of said improvement shall be borne by and assessed against the property liable therefor, as provided by law.

ORDINANCE No. 318

An Ordinance creating the office of City Engineer, providing for the appointment of said officer, defining his duties, and fixing his compensation.

The City Council of the City of Pullman do ordain as follows:

Section 1. That there is hereby created the office of City Engineer.

Section 2. That the City Engineer shall be appointed by the Mayor of the City, and said appointment shall be confirmed by the City Council.

Section 3. That the City Engineer shall hold office at the pleasure of the mayor.

Section 4. That the City Engineer shall perform such duties as shall be prescribed by the Council.

Section 5. That the City Engineer shall receive as compensation for his services the sum of \$1.00 per hour for each and every hour he is actually employed by the city on its work.

Section 6. That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and five days after its publication in the official newspaper of the City of Pullman.



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
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
