### DECORATION DAY

Next Tuesday, May 30, will mark the beginning of a new era in Pullman so far as the observance of the national Decoration Day is concerned. In former years Decoration Day has been observed alone as a day to place flowers on the graves of the soldier dead. Unfortunately at few, aside from the living soldiers and the ladies of their auxiliary, the W. R. C., have taken more than a passing interest in the activities of the day. This year, upon the invitation of the old soldiers of Pullman and the ladies of the W. R. C., most every fraternal organization in the city will take part in the activities, joining with the veterans and the ladies in doing just honor to the deceased veterans and at the same time paying tribute to the deceased of their own ranks. This condition is as it should be. Every red-blooded American citizen should respect the memory of the dead heroes of the civil war and honor the living veterans. Every man, woman and child, on Decoration Day, should take part in the ceremonies of placing flowers and American flags on the graves of the soldier dead. Then, that better method of completing a work so well begun than by placing flowers of love and friendship on the graves of our own loved ones, the resting places of the members of our own families, be it blood relation or fraternal brothers and sisters.

Fraternal organizations in the past have observed a memorial day separate and apart from that observed by the old soldiers as national memorial day. At the recent sessions of the grand lodge of the order of Pythias a resolution was adopted changing the date of the national memorial day to that observed by the veterans. Other fraternal organizations are expected to flow suit and assist in making the national day of respect to the dead universally observed by all the people of the United States. Pullman's fraternal organizations will take the lead in this movement next Tuesday, when they will observe, with the veterans, the national Decoration Day, as a movement worthy of the cooperation of all.

### THE MOCK SALES

When he inaugurated the annual mock sales and shows of the Saddle and Siroin club of the State College last year Prof. William Hislop, head of the animal husbandry division of the State College, placed the college of the city of Pullman in a position to receive much valuable advertising as well as providing invaluable practical work for his students. Last year as well as this year he showed public spirit by staging the big attraction on the business streets

and parading the college stock through town, thus providing entertainment and education for the people of Pullman and the farmers of the surrounding country and bringing many outsiders to the college town. The Chamber of Commerce and the people of Pullman lent their assistance to the movement and aided to some extent in making the affairs a success. The daily press has evidenced an eagerness for all news in connection with the sales and the event has been given wide publicity. The attention of many people has been attracted to the college and the city as places where big things are accomplished solely through the mock sales conducted by the animal husbandry club.

Now there opens a wider field for usefulness. The Saddle and Siroin club and Prof. Hislop have evidenced a desire to add other features to the sales, features that will bring many more people to Pullman each year and will prove of much deeper interest to the farmers. The people of the city must do their part if these hopes of a bigger and a better attraction are to be realized. The opportunity is one not to be overlooked. It may mean the expenditure of a little money and surely the expenditure of considerable energy on the part of the citizens, but the good results are a certainty, and will repay a hundred fold any pecuniary assistance or hard work that attaches.

### THE SIGN QUESTION

The Herald believes that the offer of the Goodrich Tire company to provide sign boards for all the principal road crossings in Whitman county should be accepted forthwith. Almost every day some tourist, and in many cases persons who have resided in Whitman county many years, finds himself miles out of his way because the road crossings are not properly marked to direct him. This condition should be improved and the quickest and probably the cheapest way to get the desired results is to accept the offer of the tire company. The signs provided by the company are of metal, and will stand many years longer than the board signs. They are of neat design, and each is marked for the particular location in which it is to be erected. The company furnishes a complete map with each set of signs, and the county is pledged only to plant posts and place signs at the places noted on the map. The expense of this work would be nominal compared with the good results obtained, and the Chamber of Commerce has done the right thing in appointing a committee to boost the plan.

### THE SOLOMONS OF PULLMAN ARE WOMEN

Woman against woman or women against women was the novel enter-

tainment staged at Pullman on Tuesday. The world has long been familiar with the sight of woman sitting as judge of man and of men, as in the medieval tournaments, which led Milton to speak of "the ladies whose bright eyes rain influence and adjudge the prize." The west has become accustomed to women sitting on juries and judging mere men. But feminine jurors holding the scales of justice firmly and evenly between contending women offer a novelty.

Dame A assaulted and battered Madam Z, but each maintains that the other originated the cruel war. It was waged, according to masculine standards, with the fury of irate doves. Wrath dwelt, as Virgil words it, in the celestial bosoms. A railroad spike did duty for Jove's thunderbolt in the hands of one feminine combatant, and the scalping of a "switch" by the other warrior repeated the rape of the lock of which Pope chanted in mock heroic strains. Unfortunately, however, for the comic spirit the temper of Macbeth and Macduff was wanting to the Pullman Amazons. Neither cried "Lay on, Macduff! and damned be he that first cries 'Hold, enough!'" On the contrary, each lady in the Pullman duel modestly claims that she was first to cry "Enough!" The heroines agreed unanimously that discretion was the better part of their valor.

Such a case presents legal complications of embarrassing character. Evidently it was no matter for a mere man or body of men to sit in judgment upon. The so-called superior sex would have been hopelessly outclassed as judges, heavily handicapped as jurors, in trying to weigh the merits and demerits of the affair. Paris of Troy, who foolishly acted as judge between Aphrodite, Athena and Hera, goddesses, respectively, of love, wisdom and power, had a soft snap compared to what the Pullman men's job would have been if they had tackled this task, and yet he made the two strongest feminine divinities his and his city's foes and brought about his own and his country's fall. If the heroic sons of Pullman had played the part of Daniel come to judgment the war of the sexes would have begun and the dove of peace have fled from the classic shades of the college forever. But behold the benefit of women for jurors. They settled the war offhand with a verdict of acquittal for the defendant.



