

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON WINS CONFERENCE MEET

Stars, Fee, Nelson and Muirhead, Appropriate Big End of Score— Idaho Second—W. S. C. Fourth

NEW CONFERENCE RECORDS
440-yard dash—Kadderly, O. A. C., 48.3-5 seconds.
220-yard hurdles—Hoover, Whitman, 24 2-5 seconds.
High jump—Muirhead, Oregon, 6 feet, 1.92 inches.

Three Conference records were broken Saturday when the University of Oregon won, for the second time, the Northwest Conference Track Meet held on Rogers Field. The lemon and green athletes scored in 11 of the 14 events, and finished 8 points ahead of Idaho, who, with Massey entered, was slated by the dopsters to give Oregon a close battle. The final score and order in which the teams finished were as follows:

University of Oregon.....37

In the Conference, as they have in the dual meets, Fee and Muirhead proved a winning combination for the Oregon school. Together, they were responsible for 24 of the total number of points registered by their team. Fee was the individual point winner with a total of 13, taking first in the javelin, second in the pole vault and the broad jump, and third in the shot put and the high jump. With the single exception of the high hurdles in which he finished third but was disqualified, Fee scored in each event in which he was an entrant. His team mate, Muirhead, was a close second for individual honors by virtue of two firsts, one in the high jump and another in the high hurdles. He was a close third in the broad jump. The Conference record, 6 feet 1.88 inches in the high jump, formerly held by Stuller of Oregon, was raised by Muirhead to 6 feet 1.92 inches.

Hoover, of Whitman, and Morrison, of Idaho, tied for third honors with 8 points each. Hoover took first and third places in the low and the high hurdles respectively while Morrison was first in the 220 and second in the 100 yard dash. The first record to fall was that of the 440 when Kadderly of O. A. C. broke the tape after covering the distance in 48.3. Schachtler of W. S. C., whose game finish almost won the event, also ran under the former record, 49.3. Schachtler's time was 49:1. Hoover, of Whitman, in winning the low hurdle, was forced to accomplish the feat in 24:2, finishing by inches only, in front of McCroskey, and lowering the latter's record by 2-5 of a second. One of the big surprises of the day was the beating of Morrison in the 100-yard dash by his team mate, Richmond of Idaho. The two Yellow and White runners got away to a flying start and could have been covered by a blanket throughout the race. Miller of W. S. C. who was slated for a place in the event was left on the scratch by four yards, but with a magnificent burst of speed he finished in fourth position only a step behind the leaders. In the 220 Miller showed even better form than in the 100. After another slight handicap in the start, he all but caught Morrison in the first half of the course, and running on practically even terms finished so well to the front that by many he was thought to have beaten the Idaho phenom.

The pole vault previously conceded by the knowing ones to Fee of Oregon, furnished genuine thrills. The Oregon athlete, with a mark of 12 feet 4 1-4 inches, on failing to do better than 11 feet 10 inches, was second to Cassidy of Idaho, who cleared the bar at 12 feet. Thompson, of W. S. C. was the first to qualify at 11 feet 6 inches, but could go no higher.

Fee, of Oregon, came close to a Conference record in the javelin when he threw the stick 184 feet 1 inch. In other attempts to raise the official mark, 186 feet, held by Phillips, of Idaho, he did more than 182 feet.

By heaving the shot 40.66 feet Johnson of O. A. C. gained a slight margin over Bohm of Idaho. Cole of O. A. C. won the discus. Schachtler contributed the real thrill when, in the relay, after beginning the last quarter several yards behind Morrison, he overcame the lead of the Idaho speed man and crossed the tape a winner by inches. His performance was a marvel in speed and gameness. At its conclu-

sion, the crowd of W. S. C. students and supporters rushed upon the track, hoisted Schachtler and Capt. McCroskey to the shoulders of the foremost, and carried them from the field. The result of the race was more surprising because of the early lead of the Idaho and the U. of O. runners. Handicapped by at least ten yards, Capt. McCroskey in the second quarter, carried the baton from the hand of McClung, who had been boxed, to Miller who got away on almost even terms with the leaders. However, Gerlough of Idaho and Staub of Oregon won the few yards advantage for their successors which Schachtler overcame in the final dash.

NOTES ON THE MEET
Coleman was not pushed very much at the finish of the mile so did not extend himself. Schlaefler led the field for three-quarters of the way but fell back when Coleman stiffened the pace. Schlaefler ran a good race, however, making the best time that he has made this year.

The record established by Muirhead in the high jump required some close figuring. Stuller held the record at 6 feet 1.88 inches. Muirhead raised it .4 of an inch.

Cassidy of Idaho just barely knocked the bar off on his third trial at 12 feet. On his seventh effort he cleared it at that height.

Smith, running the two-mile, heard Hayward tell Bostwick to remember the last 300. Jitney thought the distance was what Bostwick was depending upon so he loafed until the last 300 and beat the Oregon runner at his own game.

Many of the spectators thought that Idaho had won the relay. The judges unanimously picked W. S. C. and Coach Rademacher of Idaho agreed.

The relay marked the passing of Captain Lusker McCroskey from active participation as a W. S. C. athlete. His great sprint made it possible for his team's triumph and but for the unfortunate loss of his stride at the last jump, he would have at least tied Hoover in the low hurdles. Mc's long suit has been the sprint to the tape.

No one was more surprised than Cassidy of Idaho when he won the pole vault. However, neither Fee nor "Pug" Thompson have sprung any allbibs.

Speaking of records, no one thought to even equal the dash Palouse-ward of H. Lynn Tuttle on Campus Day. No less than four watches in a six-cylinder touring car indicate that H. Lynne's run was "well timed."
