

DEATH CLAIMS TWO ESTEEMED CITIZENS

G. W. Harter and W. H. Meglemre
Laid to Rest Early This Week—
Both Leave Widows and
Children

G. W. HARTER

George W. Harter died at his home on Military hill early Saturday morning, June 17, after a long illness from heart trouble, followed by dropsy. He was 70 years, 11 months and 15 days of age.

Funeral services were held from Kimball's chapel Sunday afternoon at 2:30, in charge of the Rev. Harley Jackson. The members of the local post of the G. A. R. attended in a body, as well as the ladies of the W. R. C., and members of the Sons of Veterans organization served as pallbearers.

George Washington Harter was born in Ohio in 1845. When but a small boy he removed with his parents to Illinois, where he grew to manhood and enlisted for service in the Civil war. On March 30, 1874, he was married to Sarah Drinkwater. To this union eight children were born, four girls and four boys, all but one of whom, with the widow, survive. After spending 25 years of his life in Missouri, Mr. Harter came to Pullman with his family some 16 years ago, and has since made this city his home. He was a member of Whitman Post, No. 53, G. A. R.

For the last year Mr. Harter had been confined to his home the greater part of the time. He was a man who attended strictly to his own affairs, was industrious and honest and a good neighbor.

W. H. MEGLEMRE

William H. Meglemre, aged 83 years, nine months and five days, died at his home Saturday evening, June 17 from senile decay. Funeral services were held from the family home Monday morning at 10:00 o'clock, conducted by the Rev. Harley Jackson. Burial was in the city cemetery.

William Haden Meglemre was born in Bedford, Indiana, in 1822. When about 20 years of age he removed to Missouri, where he was married to Lucinda Jane Pate, who lived only eight months following the wedding. On April 22, 1860, he was again married, to Mary Elizabeth Haun. To this union were born four children, two of them, with the aged widow, being left to mourn his death. He later removed with his family to the state of Oregon, and after living at several places in that state moved to California. Eight years ago the family came to Pullman, and the head of the family passed away quietly at 8:00 p. m. Saturday, leaving a widow, one son and one daughter.

Mr. Meglemre was a member of the state militia in Missouri, where he took an active interest in public affairs, being well posted on political and religious questions. He became a member of the Christian church in 1860 and remained true to the faith until his death. For the past three years old age has weighed heavily on his shoulders and he was confined to his home almost entirely.

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
