

PULLMAN SCHOOLS TO OPEN TUESDAY

Full Directions as to Where Children Are to Report to Be Enrolled

The following preliminary assignment of pupils has been prepared by Superintendent Graham:

All pupils who are in grades below the seventh and live in the Edison school district will report for enrollment and classification at the Edison school on College hill.

All pupils in grades seven and eight report at Main building to George Schroder, principal.

All pupils who are in grades below the seventh and do not live in the Edison district, report at the Main building.

Parents of beginners are urged to have their children enter at the beginning of the term. Beginners may not enter after October 1.

All who were enrolled in the Pullman schools last year and promoted to the high school, and all new pupils planning to enter high school will report to Principal W. A. Lacey in the high school assembly room. Several high school teachers will be assigned to the Freshman class to help new pupils in making their schedules.

All Freshmen who plan to take a regular four-year course should schedule as follows: English I, algebra I, and two from the following group: manual training, domestic science, ancient history, general science, commercial arithmetic, beginning Latin.

Those who plan to continue in the scientific course should elect general science and one other.

Those who desire the commercial course should elect commercial arithmetic and one other, etc.

That is, one subject chosen will determine the course and the other be a free elective. In case a student is hesitating between two courses, he will be advised to elect those two subjects in the Freshman year and not decide finally upon his course until the beginning of his Sophomore year.

Superintendent Graham and Principal Lacey will be at the high school Friday, September 1, and Saturday, September 2, from 9:00 a. m. until 12 m. and from 1:30 to 4:30 p. m.

There will be a general teachers' meeting Monday, September 4, in room 1 of the high school building at 2:30 p. m. All teachers are hereby notified to be present at this meeting.

W. S. C. MINING MEN FLOCK TO MONTANA




