**AUTO DOWN CANYON;  
 NONE BADLY HURT**

**Occupants of Car Escape Miraculously When Machine Tumbles 150 Feet on O'Dell Grade—Pullman Men See Accident**

Charles S. Hill and R. Lanning, while returning from LaCrosse Wednesday afternoon, were witnesses of an automobile accident on the O'Dell grade, 16 miles west of Pullman, in which the car tumbled 150 feet down a steep hillside and both the occupants escaped with only minor bruises. The Pullman men were approaching a sharp turn in the road when they observed another car coming down the grade. They drove to the side of the road so as not to meet the approaching machine on the turn and stopped, watching the progress of the other car. The driver, who gave his name as John Shoner, evidently attempted to stop the machine before he reached the turn in the road, but lost control and plunged over the steep embankment, the car turning over and over in its downward flight and finally stopping right side up with the driver still intact and uninjured. His lady companion was thrown from the machine before it stopped and sustained severe bruises to her limbs.

The Pullman men rushed to the scene of the accident, expecting to find both the occupants of the car dead. They assisted the couple to the road and took them to a nearby farm house. The car, a Buick, was almost totally ruined, all the wheels being broken off and the body and top badly smashed. The escape from death or serious injury of the couple was considered little short of miraculously by the witnesses. The car is said to have belonged to Will Hickman.

A peculiar feature in connection with the case is the fact that Mr. Lanning, the night before the trip, dreamed vividly of just such an accident.
