

W. S. C. OVERWHELMS MONTANA U.

Offering a defense that surpassed any resistance of last year's champions, and maintaining a consistent, powerful offense, Washington State's rejuvenated eleven swept Montana's team off its feet, winning Saturday's game 27-0. Three touchdowns, as many goals from touchdowns, and two drop kicks account for W. S. C.'s margin. Eleven penalties retarded but failed to stop the onslaught of the Dietz machine which, using only a comparatively few plays, but all from various formations, battered its way relentlessly through and over its opponents. At no time during the game was the Crimson and Gray goal seriously endangered. Save for a few minutes in the last quarter when the Grizzlies in desperation tried to slip over a chance forward pass, the play was entirely in Montana's territory. Washington State was superior in all departments.

After the first five minutes of play in which Capt. Bangs ran 45 yards for the first Crimson and Gray touchdown, the noise of the 100 Washington rooters completely drowned the yells of the Montana section to whom it was plain that Nissen's Grizzlies were completely outclassed. The ease and suddenness of the initial scoring surprised even the most optimistic of the W. S. C. supporters. After Montana had received and failed to gain, two line smashes by Dietz's men netted 13 yards. Brown dropped back apparently for a quarter back run around the long side and so completely won the Montanans duped that Brown was repeatedly tackled while Bangs slipped through the opposite side for the longest gain of the contest. From that time forward the Grizzlies were bewildered. They fought hard and gamely but their opposition made little headway against Washington State's deceptive formations and the irresistible charges of her line. Doane and Bangs repeatedly ran through the big gaps in the opposing line for gains of from 5 to 12 yards. The Crimson and Gray forwards invariably got the jump on the Montana linemen. The former deserve unqualified praise for their contribution to the victory.

Many Penalties
Washington State was repeatedly penalized for offside play. Referee Hinderman, from his position behind the W. S. C. backs, saw them start before he could see the motion of the ball. His penalizations were responsible for more hurried passing on the part of Langdon, which no doubt had much to do with the three fumbles charged to the back field. On each occasion, the ball was recovered, however.

Brown's generalship was exceptionally masterful. Under his direction the backs ripped off big gains consistently. However, when deep in Montana's territory, frequent penalties threatened to prevent scoring. Durham was sent in to save the chance by a goal from the field. Durham's perfect boot after taking the pass from off his shoe laces showed the wisdom of the substitution. Once again, in the last quarter, Durham came to the rescue with a drop kick.

Montana's big tackles, Benz and Keeran, were disposed of on almost every play. Doane and Bangs finding big holes whenever called upon. R. Boone, from whom Coach Nissen evidently expected most trouble, seldom carried the ball, but the big fellow's interference was used effectively throughout. Doane's touchdown, the second for W. S. C., came after a series of trip hammer charges in the second.

The third was the most evenly contested of the four periods. Penalties again delayed Washington State's scoring. However, in the final quarter, the Crimson and Gray would not be denied. Terrific line smashes by Bangs and R. Boone, supplemented by brilliant end runs by R. Hanley, registered another touchdown, while Durham's unerring toe negotiated a field goal.

After trying vainly to gain either through the line or around the ends, Montana, as a last resort, endeavored to score by forward passes in the last period. An aerial attempt, Clarke to Scherck, was barely touched by Boone and counted for a 37 yard gain. With the exception of a one yard advance on a pass from McQuarrie to Molthen, Montana's other tries went for nothing. A long throw over the goal line, resulting in a touchback, gave the ball to Washington State on the latter's 20 yard line in the last few moments of the play. At that point, with Dietz's men content to play a defensive game, Bangs kicked out of danger as the final whistle sounded.

Washington State to a man played with the consistency, judgment and mastery of detail that furnished the team's impregnability last year. Save in occasional imperfect blocking while on offense, there was no cause for criticism. Montana played well but could not hope to hold an eleven of more nearly even balance and incomparable training. Scherck, end, and Jones, freshman quarterback, showed best for the Grizzlies. Capt. Clarke, because of injuries, played defensive quarter,

and as such did not show sensationally.

FOREIGN CROPS
A cablegram to the Bureau of Crop Estimates, United States Department of Agriculture, from the International Institute of Agriculture, Rome, Italy, received September 25, gives the production of wheat in England and Wales as 54,656,000 bushels, or 80.5 per cent of last year's crop, and 98 per cent of a five-year average; and the production of rice (rough) in Japan as 387,756,000 bushels, or 99.3 per cent of last year's crop, and 83.5 per cent of a five-year average.

The total crop of wheat in Spain, England, Wales, Ireland, Italy, Switzerland, Canada, the United States, India, Japan, and Tunis is given as 1,525,041,000 bushels, or 69.8 per cent of last year's crop, and 92.6 per cent of a five-year average. The total production of rye in Spain, Italy, Switzerland, Canada, and the United States is 83,202,000 bushels, or 98.7 per cent of last year's crop, and 115.4 per cent of a five-year average. The total production of barley in Spain, England, Wales, Ireland, Italy, Switzerland, Canada, the United States, Japan, and Tunis is 476,583,000 bushels, or 88.1 per cent of last year's crop, and 130.6 per cent of a five-year average. The total production of oats in Spain, England, Wales, Ireland, Italy, Switzerland, Canada, the United States, and Tunis is 1,831,288,000 bushels, or 78.2 per cent of last year's crop, and 106.8 per cent of a five-year average.
