## WAR DEPARTMENT HONORS COLLEGE

**A Captain, Lieutenant and Three Sergeants Will Drill the Cadet Corps**

STATE COLLEGE OF WASHINGTON, Pullman, Wash., Dec. 26.—The military instructional force at the State College of Washington at Pullman has been increased from one officer to five. Three sergeants have just arrived in Pullman. They are: Sergeant C. P. Connell, Coast Artillery Corps, recently stationed at Fort Casey, Washington; Sergeant Jas. B. Lawrence, direct from the Mexican border; and Sergeant William N. Puckett, formerly on the retired list.

Lieutenant Ashbrook arrived several weeks ago, and with Captain Osterman, commandant of the cadets, the total force of officers is complete.

The State college is one of the thirteen institutions in the United States which was placed in the "distinguished" class a few months ago by the War Department, and during the present month the college has been admitted to membership in the Reserve Officers' Training Corps. This membership carries with it free uniforms and equipment for the cadets, and other privileges not heretofore enjoyed by the department.

A telegram has just been received by the college from Washington, D. C., announcing that the State College will be allowed to appoint from its graduates, one second lieutenant in the Marine Corps. The appointment will carry with it a salary of \$1750 per year.

A complete machine gun equipment has been promised to the State College by the War Department.

### OPPORTUNITIES FOR YOUNG ARCHITECTS

Seven hundred dollars in prizes is offered for the designs for "a decorative and appropriate panel for a lobby of a theatre," by the society of "Friends of the Young Artists of New York City." The students in architecture at the State College will submit designs.

An open air moving picture theatre and a suit of rooms for a men's dormitory, are problems which have been given by Rudolph Weaver, head of the department of Architecture of the State College of Washington, in the series of competitions the department has inaugurated for the purpose of developing original architectural design among the students. The best design submitted so far for the open air moving picture theatre has been made by E. Walter Burkhardt of North Yakima. His design indicated a theatre located on a gently sloping piece of ground enclosed entirely by a carefully designed pergola with a well proportioned screen at one end and a lantern enclosure at the other.

In the dormitory problem, the best design has been handed in by Howard E. Hine of Tacoma. Kepler Johnson of North Yakima and Clark Eldridge of Everett are worthy of honorable mention.

### LIEUTENANT ASHBROOK HAS FINE RECORD

STATE COLLEGE OF WASHINGTON, Pullman, Wash., Dec. 26.—Lieutenant Roy Wilson Ashbrook, who has been detailed to the State College of Washington at Pullman to assist Captain Osterman with the military instruction of the cadets is a man distinguished in army circles for his bravery in the Philippines, where he received a severe wound while on duty on the Island of Mindanao. During an assault upon the Mohammedans of the hostile Moros, the artillery was unable to reach a certain part of the fort, where the natives were protected from fire. Lieutenant Ashbrook volunteered to lead a party in making an attack on the fort from the rear. The party got through the palisade which surrounded the fort, and eluding the open pits and trenches, succeeded in scaling the walls of the fort and opening direct fire on the Moros, who were then obliged to surrender. However, Lieutenant Ashbrook was hit by a spear during the engagement which passed through the left eye, just missing the brain. Two years ago the lieutenant was retired when his regiment went to the border. He is married to a daughter of the prominent General VanHorn, whom he met and became engaged to in Georgia shortly after the accident which lost him his eye.

Early in January a representative from Henry L. Doherty and Company of New York will visit the State College in order to select Senior mechanical and electrical engineers for positions in that company for next year. This company is now looking for men, but none will be available until the end of the year.
