EXPERIMENT STATION TO STUDY FORAGE PROBLEMS

An investigation of forage crop conditions will be begun at once by the Experiment Station at the State College of Washington, as the result of two appropriations of \$4000 each—one from the federal Congress, just adjourned, and one from the state legislature.

The problem of adequate forage is considered by Dr. Ira D. Cardiff, Director of the Experiment Station, to be one of the most important agricultural problems that confronts the State of Washington.

"With its large areas of land which can not be cultivated," said Dr. Cardiff, "Washington is certain always to remain an important livestock state. The development of this industry, however, will depend greatly upon the ability of the state to produce forage in quantity and quality, particularly for winter feed."

"Throughout the dry districts in central Washington, the only forage is dry wheat hay; in the non-irrigated districts of eastern Washington, the farmers are hampered by the lack of a suitable pasture crop, and in western Washington the forage problems are many, especially those dealing with pests that destroy forage crops. Furthermore, the farmers of the state are still somewhat in the dark as to the best silage crop. The Experiment Station hopes to make contributions along all of these lines through the investigational work. I can not be accurately predicted what the results of the investigations will be; but an opportunity is given the station by these appropriations to be of much greater service to the state."

A new breed of poultry has been reported to the State College of Washington, developed by Rev. J. D. Bird of Waverly. The name to be given to the breed is "Golden Barred Rocks."

BROODERS AND THEIR CONTENTS

The problem of brooding chicks differs with general conditions and numbers, but briefly summed up the requirements of a successful brooder system are:

Ability to maintain temperature of 65 to 100 degrees under control. Heat should be supplied from center overhead instead of bottom or side and there should be no danger of fire or fumes from lamp or stove in air breathed by chicks.

Ventilation should be without drafts with currents of warm air directed toward chicks and currents of cold air directed away. The lower should be roomy to prevent crowding, dry and capable of being raised to give chicks head room as they grow.

Sunlight and shade, a cool space for exercising and feeding should be provided. Brooder must be capable of easy cleaning and disinfecting and should be thoroughly cleaned every day after the first week.

The first three days of the chick's life its greatest need is for even temperature, plenty of sleep and a drink of water at will.

A critical time in the chick's life comes with its transfer from the incubator. Leave chicks in the incubator nursery the first night, keep at a steady temperature of 95 degrees. Heat brooder to 90 degrees, transfer chicks rapidly and in 15 minutes the heat of chicks will raise brooder temperature to 95 degrees.—Helen Dow Whitaker, Poultry Extension Specialist, State College of Washington.
