INTERESTING LETTER FROM THE FRONT

Nephew of C. D. Martin in Thickest of the Fray—Explains Feelings of Men Under Fire

The following interesting letter from the front was written by Sergeant George Winship of Athena, Oregon, a nephew of C. D. Martin of this city:

"Have been going to write for the past week, but am on the front and have little time for writing. Have been on the front since July 4th. The work I am now in is to keep autos and guns going, also see that they have ammunition, which is sure some job. Have eight men under me, and we never know when we will be called upon to make a trip to one of the batteries. It gives one a queer feeling to go along the road, knowing that you might connect up with a 155 G. P. F. But I like this better than being in camps like we have been, for here we have noise in the daytime and fireworks at night.

"The heaviest fighting is between 2:30 a. m. and 12.00 noon, rain or shine, it goes on just the same. I saw the Germans set a French balloon on fire, also an airplane battle yesterday. This life is sure a thrill from start to finish. We hang onto our steel derbys and gas masks now. They are our best friends.

"It's pitiful to see the poor French people leaving their homes. It is a sad sight to see hundreds of them along the roads taking their few belongings and stock with them. Yesterday I went out to bring in a Dodge and I passed an old lady and a small boy; one was leading a cow and the other a sheep, all they had left in the world, or at least time to bring with them. This is the saddest part of the war, to my thinking, but things of which I can not write show that it won't be long before they will again have their homes back.

"Have been watching the Germans fire at an observation balloon, also an air fight. As I write this, the 155 G. P. F.'s are sure making some noise. It's now 9:00 p. m., so it won't be long until the big battle starts up for the night. It was a warm one last night. It seemed as if I could reach the shells going over, and it was a sight to watch them break.

"I have to accompany each ammunition train from the dump to the guns—scary at times, but I like it. I figure that if my name is on one of them I will get it, no matter where I am. Feeling that way, I am not afraid. Must stop and curl up for a little nap.
