REGULAR BOAT SERVICE HAS BEEN RESUMED

G. A. Mussgang, passenger agent for the San Francisco and Portland Steamship line was in Pullman Tuesday. He states that regular service has been resumed and that the steamer "Rose City" will leave Portland, Astoria, June 2, 11, 20, and 29, at 12 noon and until further notice every nine days thereafter. Service is between Portland and San Francisco only. Through tickets will be issued to points beyond San Francisco via rail or connecting steamship lines. The "Rose City" is a steel constructed 4000-ton boat, a length 332 feet and has been entirely overhauled. It is in excellent condition and meets all the requirements of a first-class seagoing vessel. The trip from Portland to San Francisco is made in about 50 hours, including a stop at Astoria. From Portland to Astoria the trip is made in daylight, giving passengers full enjoyment of the beautiful scenery along the Columbia river. The shore is constantly in sight after leaving Astoria. Steamer arrives in San Francisco, Pier 40, in the afternoon of the second day. Fares from Portland to San Francisco are: Promenade deck—\$24.00. Outside main deck—\$22.00. Inside main deck—\$20.00. War tax 8 per cent. Fares include berth and meals. Children five years of age, and under twelve, one-half rate; children two years of age, and under five for seat at table in dining room, \$3.00, war tax, 24 cents. Baggage allowance, 150 pounds on each full ticket, half tickets, 75 pounds.
