### VOCATIONAL STUDENT RECEIVES FRENCH CROSS

Sergeant Raymond J. Hague, a federal vocational student at the State College, has just received a French Croix de Guerre, accompanied by a citation by Marshal Pétain, commander-in-chief of the armies of the east. The citation relates that near Wortgen, Belgium, November 1, 1918, Sergeant Hague "displayed great courage and initiative in organizing the positions of a platoon under heavy machine gun and artillery fire." Sergeant Hague is taking a course in agriculture at the State College to fit himself for a life work. He was severely wounded in action, but is slowly regaining his health.

### VETERINARIANS HONOR DR. AND MRS. NELSON

Dr. and Mrs. S. B. Nelson are the recipients of a dinner service set of hammered silver, given by the veterinarians of the state of Washington in recognition of 25 years of service which Dr. Nelson has rendered the veterinary profession of Washington as head of the college of veterinary medicine here, experiment station veterinarian, former state veterinarian, and lecturer. The gift was made at the Spokane meeting of the Washington veterinary association, August 8, but the formal presentation was deferred until Dr. Nelson returned from Washington, D. C. Neither Dr. nor Mrs. Nelson knew of the gift until the set was presented by Dr. E. E. Wegner, in behalf of the state association of veterinarians.

### SCIENTISTS VISIT COLLEGE

They are investigating the work which is being done at the experiment station in the development of smut resisting varieties of wheat.
