

ALFRED CORTOT COMES TO PULLMAN

French Pianist Secured by Music Department for Monday, March 29

Alfred Cortot, the noted French pianist, will be heard at the college auditorium on Monday evening, March 29. Several of the numbers to be given on his Pullman program are recorded on Victrola records and are attracting attention at Watt's pharmacy.



Not since Paderewski first started America by his genius has any pianist met with such instantaneous recognition as Alfred Cortot, who was heard here for the first time last season. "A player of remarkable imagination and fire, of strongly marked individuality," Cortot is a master musician, "sane and wholly non-decadent in his tendencies." "He can thunder like a Titan, and glide over those same keys a moment later with an almost swan-like touch." That he is virile, that he is brilliant, that he has an amazing force and strength in reserve, which one of the New York critics advises some of the younger Russians to imitate, is generally conceded.

When he played in England and Ireland shortly after his American tour, many of the prominent critics pronounced the effect as "electrical." And while all were agreed as to the brilliance and grandeur of his playing, they found, also, that he had a mind and a soul—qualities not usually associated with brilliance. With all his vitality and nerve, Cortot possesses a delicacy and a wealth of poetic feeling which gives infinite variety to his playing. His ingratiating personality and the modesty of his bearing added to the impression he made, winning for him a fixed place in the affections of the American public.

VALUABLE BUG COLLECTION

Melander Secures \$10,000 Insect Collection for \$500—Cases Arriving Now

Another feather has been added to the cap of the State College zoological department with the recent purchase of a \$10,000 collection of insects for \$500, by Dr. A. L. Melander, head of the department.

The collection was made by the late Oliver S. Westcott of Chicago, a former instructor of Dr. Melander's, and contains 45,000 insects, representing 68 years of search in the United States, Alaska, and Mexico.

On receiving news of his former teacher's death, Dr. Melander at once made efforts to obtain this valuable collection, with the result that some of the great crates containing the specimens are even now in place in Science hall.

PLAN FOR COMMENCEMENT

Plans are already under way for the 24th annual commencement of the State College of Washington, to be held the week of June 5 to 10.

At a meeting last Wednesday of the commencement committee, composed of Professors C. A. Isaacs, Frank Thayer, and C. C. Todd, plans were discussed and the date for commencement set for June 10. The speakers for the exercises have not been announced.

There are more than 200 candidates for degrees and the committee has announced that the coming commencement will be the largest the college has ever had.

RESOLUTION No. 370

Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Pullman, Washington: 1. That it is the intention of the City Council, and it hereby declares its intention to improve the following described streets, to-wit: Beginning on College Avenue at the west line of Nevada street, thence west along College Avenue to the County Road; beginning on Columbia Avenue at the west line of Nevada street, thence west along Columbia street, thence east along Tacoma street, beginning on Spokane street at the south line of College avenue, thence south along Spokane street to its intersection with Columbia avenue; beginning on Idaho street at the south line of Columbia avenue, thence south along Idaho street to

the intersection with Columbia avenue, by filling, grading, curbing, guttering and paving said streets, and doing such other work as may be necessary in connection therewith, all in accordance with the plans and specifications to be prepared by the city's engineer.

2. That all persons who may desire to object thereto are hereby notified to appear and present such objections at a meeting of the City Council to be held in the Council Chamber in the City Hall in the City of Pullman, Washington, at 8:00 o'clock p. m., on the 20th day of April, 1920, which time and place is hereby fixed for hearing all matters relating to said improvement, and all objections thereto, and for determining the method of payment for same.

3. That the city engineer is hereby instructed to submit to the City Council on or before the 20th day of April, 1920, an estimate of the cost and expense of the improvement herein contemplated, together with the statement of the proportionate amount thereof which should be borne by the property within the proposed assessment district, together with a statement of the aggregate valuation of the real estate exclusive of improvements within said district, according to the last valuation placed upon it for the purpose of general taxation, together with a diagram or print showing thereon the lots, tracts, parcels of land or other prop-

erty which will be especially benefited by said improvement, together with his estimate of the amount of the cost and expense of said improvement which should be borne by each lot, tract, parcel of land or other property.

4. Be it further resolved: That the City Clerk shall cause this resolution to be published in two consecutive issues of The Pullman Herald, the official newspaper of the City of Pullman, Washington; the first publication to be at least 15 days before the 20th day of April, 1920.

5. That the cost and expense of said improvement shall be borne by and assessed against the property liable therefore, as provided by law. Passed this 16th day of March, 1920.


