SPOKANE PRESBYTERY MEETS IN PULLMAN

Dr. W. A. Stephenson Elected Moderator for Coming Year—Dr. Spalding Stated Clerk

The Spokane Presbytery of the United Presbyterian church met in the Pullman church on Monday afternoon, holding sessions over until Tuesday noon. The out-of-town delegates were Rev. A. T. Smith, Rev. W. A. Stewart, Dr. W. A. Stevenson, Elder John Barton, and City Missionary Miss Laura Sawhill, all of Spokane. Rev. D. A. Russell and Elder A. J. Johnson of Washtucna, Rev. I. L. Crooks of Hooper and M. M. Gaiser of Spirit Lake, Idaho.

Dr. W. A. Stephenson was elected moderator for the coming year and Dr. W. A. Spalding was elected stated clerk, taking the place of John Anderson of Spokane, resigned.

Monday evening Dr. Stephenson gave a very interesting lecture on "The Genius of the Inter-Church World Movement." The remaining sessions were largely given over to business and reviewing of reports.

The showing of the past year was a good advance all along the line. There was a growth in membership over the past year of 14 per cent. The gain by means of profession of faith over the year before was 62.6 per cent. The gain in the membership of the young people's societies was 56.93 per cent. In the way of contributions to the women's work was a gain of 91.12 per cent. The Bible school funds showed a gain of 35 per cent. And so the whole work of the Presbytery makes a fine showing.

Dr. Spalding was elected the delegate to the meeting of the general committee of home missions to meet in Kansas City, Mo., the 19th of May and to the general assembly which meets at Sterling, Kan., the 26th of May. T. J. Overman is the lay delegate going from Spokane.

One of the theological seminaries of the church is at present located at Xenia, Ohio. It has been decided to move the institution to some place in the far or middle west. Action was

taken looking toward the possibility of having it located at Pullman. It would also mean having incorporated with it a Bible school for the training of young people for distinctively Christian work. This will be taken up by Dr. Spalding to see what may be accomplished.

While here the Presbytery delegates were entertained for meals by Mrs. W. A. Spalding in her home on Ash street, assisted by a number of the ladies of the church. A vote of thanks was given by the Presbytery, voicing their appreciation of the entertainment received.

In looking over the records Dr. Spalding discovers that he was the first clerk of the Presbytery at its organization about 30 years ago. It seems to him like getting back on

the old job which he held for a good many years in those early days.

SPALDINGS VISIT SPIRIT LAKE

Dr. and Mrs. Spalding go this week end to Spirit Lake, Idaho. The pulpit will be filled by the Rev. Mr. Falkner of the college. About 10 years ago Dr. Spalding spent three years in Spirit Lake building the church and parsonage, and has not visited the place since. 
