COUGARS LOSE TO O.A.C. BY ERRATIC FIELDING

Shut Out 11-0 on Friday-Saturday's Game Postponed by Rain - Pitchers Lack Support

Seven errors, ten hits coming at the opportune times, tells the story of an 11-0 defeat received by the State College Cougars at the hands of the fast coming O. A. C. team. Seven scattered singles show why the Cougars were held scoreless for the first time this year.

In the first innings O. A. C. loaded the bases with a walk and a couple of errors and with none down, things looked bad for the Cougars. However, Lewis pitched out of a hole when Keene forced Hubbard at home and Palfray struck out on an attempted hit and run with the result that Hartman was caught coming home.

W. S. C. also loaded the bases in the first canto when Keene walked three men. With one gone Keene then settled down and wiffed both Morgan and D. Hanley.

O. A. C. scored first in the third inning when Hubbard rolled one down the third base line and circled the bases when Morgan and Loren relayed the ball in.

Two errors, a base on balls with bunched hits brought in three runs in the fourth inning for the visitors. They also chased two across in the fifth and three in the seventh. Cook went in and held them safe in the eighth but allowed them to chase two across the rubber in the ninth.

W. S. C. was never dangerous after the first inning and Keene seemed the master at all times.
