### CIVIL SERVICE EXAM

The U. S. civil service commission announces an examination to be held at Pullman, Wash., on June 26, 1920, for the purpose of establishing an eligible register from which selections may be made to fill vacancy in the position of calculating machine operator, \$1200 per annum, in the internal revenue service at Tacoma, Wash.

All citizens of the United States who meet the requirements, both men and women, may enter this examination; appointing officers, however, have the legal right to specify the sex desired in requesting certification of eligibles. Applicants must have reached their 18th birthday on the date of the examination. Age limits do not apply to persons

entitled to preference on account of military or naval service.

For further information and application blank address the local secretary, board of civil service examiners, Pullman, Wash.; or the secretary, 11th U. S. civil service district, 303 Post Office Bldg., Seattle, Wash. An examination is also announced to be held at Pullman, Wash., on June 26, 1920, to establish an eligible register from which selection may be made to fill a vacancy in the position of addressograph operator, at \$1200 per annum, in the internal revenue service, at Tacoma, Wash.


