

napped from her parents by the vice ring and placed in a house of ill-fame. After several days behind locked doors she escaped and ran to a police officer standing on the street corner, to whom she unfolded her story. Instead of affording the protection sought, the police officer returned the girl to the house. She told the story of her attempted escape to another of the inmates, who informed her of the work of the Salvation Army in such cases and told her that if she had gone there she would have been protected and saved. The unfortunate girl again escaped, and this time made her way to the Salvation Army headquarters, clothed only in light sleeping garments. There she found love and protection. The Army at once started suit against the owner of the house, but the influence and money of the owner secured a postponement of the case from time to time until the unfortunate girl, whose health had been robbed, passed away.

"If we had only the condition of the girls themselves to meet our work would be easy," said the speaker, "but we have been forced to fight the powerful vice rings, the corrupt police departments and courts, the indifference and unorganized support of the public, and our task has been a hard one."

The Salvation Army, according to Mrs. Robinson, does not recognize the so-called double standard of morals. She pointed out that an imaginary black line has been drawn by the average human mind between purity and sin. A man may cross and recross at will; he is censured but not condemned. If a woman crosses, she is gone beyond redemption in the eyes of the public, and the finger of scorn is pointed at her throughout the remainder of her days. She is a social outcast. This condition, the Army believes, has driven thousands of women to lives of shame who might otherwise have been restored to womanhood and happiness.

Several members of the Pullman Salvation Army committee accompanied Mrs. Robinson to Colfax Tuesday afternoon to meet with the Colfax citizens in the interests of the Opportunity Week drive for funds. Among those who attended the Colfax meeting were Mr. and Mrs. D. F. Staley, Mr. and Mrs. George T. McMahon, Mrs. Lulu Downen, Judge Thos. Neil and T. C. Martin.

During the past week D. F. Staley, chairman of the committee for this district, accompanied by J. S. Klemgard, committee member, visited several towns in the interests of the campaign for funds. Organizations for the local work were perfected at Tekoa, Oakesdale, Palouse and other points, and every indication points to a substantial oversubscription of the quota.

"If it were possible for Mrs. Robinson to carry her message personally to every town in the county the people would contribute \$10,000 instead of the \$4000 asked of the two districts and still feel that they had not done enough," said Chairman Staley.

D. F. Staley, chairman of the local Salvation Army committee, reported that while no subscriptions have been asked for prior to Opportunity Week, one \$100 subscription has already been made and every indication points to an oversubscription of the quota without active solicitation.
