### THE REASONS WHY

The REPUBLICAN PARTY is the party of SECURITY and PROGRESS in nation and state. Republican national administration, Republican Congress and Republican state officials mean security for the rights and property of the people; wise, economical, administration of government and passage of laws to promote development and prosperity of nation and state.

### REPUBLICAN LEGISLATURES HAVE

Encouraged state and county agricultural fairs; Empowered State College to establish experiment stations; Enacted a new water code; Prevented importation of diseased stock and affected horticultural products; Planned a comprehensive highway system and improvement of farmers' roads; Given authority to voters in counties to establish agricultural development districts and created office of superintendent of farm marketing.

Gov. Hart reorganized Public Service Commission and abolished practice of allowing salaries of grain inspectors to be paid in part by millers and warehousemen.

Republican Legislatures have passed 74 laws for the betterment of labor. They have passed many laws for the general benefit of the state, such as the Railroad Commission Law, the Direct Primary Act, the Initiative, Referendum and Recall and other progressive measures.
