COUNTY LOSES BIG  
\$25,000 DAMAGE SUIT

Mrs. Harold Howe was awarded damages in the sum of \$25,000 against Whitman county in the Spokane courts yesterday. The suit resulted from an automobile accident on the highway near Steptoe last fall, in which Mr. Howe lost his life. Mrs. Howe sued the county for \$25,000 for alleged dereliction in keeping the roads in repair. The jury awarded \$5000 for the pain and suffering of Mr. Howe and \$20,000 because of his family's loss through his death. Prosecuting Attorney W. L. LaFollette Jr. and Judge Thos. Neill conducted the defense for the county. Peter Zounick, driver of the car, was held blameless for the accident by the same jury which found for Mrs. Howe in the suit against the county.

RESOLUTION No. 395

Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Pullman, Washington: 1. That it is the intention of the City Council, and it hereby declares its intention to improve the following described streets, to-wit: Beginning on North Monroe street at its intersection with California street, thence north along Monroe street to its intersection with the north line of the City Limits where it crosses Monroe street (said place being about 40 feet south of the intersection of Monroe street and the Harvey County Road). Also Mich-

igan avenue between Monroe street and B street, by filling, grading curbs, guttering and paving said streets and doing such other work as may be necessary in connection therewith, all in accordance with the plans and specifications to be prepared by the City Engineer.

2. That all persons who may desire to object thereto are hereby notified to appear and present such objections at a meeting of the City Council to be held in the Council Chamber in the City Hall in the City of Pullman, Washington, at 8:00 o'clock p. m. on the 5th day of July, 1921, which time and place is hereby fixed for hearing all matters relating to said improvement, and all objections thereto, and for determining the method of payment for same.

3. That the City Engineer is hereby instructed to submit to the City Council on or before the 5th day of July, 1921, an estimate of the cost and expense of the improvement herein contemplated, together with a statement of the proportionate amount thereof which should be borne by the property within the proposed assessment district, together with a statement of the aggregate valuation placed upon it for the purpose of general taxation, together with a diagram or print showing thereon the lots, tracts, parcels of land or other property which will be especially benefited by said improvement, together with his estimate of the amount of the cost and expense of said improvement which should be borne by each lot, tract, parcel of land or other property.

4. Be it further resolved, That the City Clerk shall cause this resolution to be published in two consecutive issues of The Pullman Herald, the official newspaper of the City of Pullman, Washington; the first publication to be at least 15 days before the 5th day of July, 1921.

5. The cost and expense of said improvement shall be borne by and assessed against the property liable therefore, as provided by law.

ORDINANCE No. 394

An ordinance naming the alley through blocks No. 23, 24 and 25 and across Lot No. 4, Block No. 2, all in the Original Town of Pullman "Pioneer Way," and Blocks No. 23, 24, 25, 26 and 27, "Pioneer Place" and all of the territory embraced in Local Improvement District No. 31, lying south of McKenzie street, "Pioneer Heights."

The City Council of the City of Pullman does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That the now alley extending through Blocks No. 23, 24 and 25, and across Lot No. 4, Block No. 2, all in the Original Town of Pullman, Washington, is hereby named "Pioneer Way."

Section 2. That Blocks No. 23, 24, 25, 26 and 27, all in the Original Town of Pullman, Washington, are hereby named "Pioneer Place."

Section 3. That all of the territory embraced in Local Improvement District No. 31, lying south of McKenzie Street, is hereby named "Pioneer Heights."

Section 4. That all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance be hereby repealed.

Section 5. That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from its passage, approval and five days after its publication in the official newspaper of the City of Pullman, Washington.

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
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
