

\$4,700,735.76 Increase in Receipts

For ends, Welch has "Bones" Hanley, "Spud" Loomis and Geo. Bohanon, but the coach is trying to develop heavier men for this position. With the present schedule and the intention of playing an open game, ends will come in for a lot of heavy work.

Backfield

Backfield material is more plentiful and is causing the coaching staff less concern. Saturday afternoon the backs were given practice in running back punts and the line men in tackling.

Captain Dunlap, Jenne and Dunton are booting the ball in good shape and any one of these men could be used during a game in case of necessity. Jenne, at half-back, is expected to do most of the punting.

Line Coach Applequist is trying out several men at tackle to take the place of Fred Hamilton. It is too early in the season to predict who will fill this position, although several men will probably be used.

The Idaho game has been changed to Friday afternoon, October 21, instead of Saturday, the 22nd. This will give the Cougars an extra day to rest before leaving for Portland to play California the following Saturday.


