

ALDEN COMPLIMENTS WORK DONE BY WEAVER

A reception and exhibit were held Saturday evening, November 5, in the Mechanic Arts building, in honor of Charles H. Alden, president of the Washington chapter of American Institute of Architects, and member of the Seattle Building Code Commission, who was visiting the department of architecture at Washington State College.

The architectural department assisted by the departments of fine arts and artistic photography displayed an exhibit of students' work at this time. The exhibition was designed to show the artistic training which a student receives at the State College of Washington.

The guests expressed not a little surprise at the high standard and professional appearance of the work, which is an indication of the great strides which have been taken in the architectural educational development of the Northwest in the past ten years, since the founding of the department of architecture which was the first department organized in the northwest states.

Mr. Alden made a brief address, giving the aims of the American Institute of Architects and the efforts they are making to improve the architecture of America. In his address he highly complimented Professor Weaver on the work which he has accomplished.

During the evening members of the faculty gave a very interesting and delightful program. N. E. Reed of the dramatics department gave several Kipling readings, one of which was the well known "L'Envoi," and Miss Alice Walden of the department of music gave two piano solos, "Polonaise in C Sharp Minor" by Chopin, and "The Trout" by Schubert-Heller, in her usual brilliant style.

The feature and surprise of the evening was the singing of three numbers, "Aspiration," "Prayer" and "The Everlasting Mystery," the words and music of which were written and composed by Rudolph Weaver and Miss Alice Walden. Mr. Nammy's rendition of these songs was exceptional. He seemed to lose himself entirely in the full spirit of the poems, bringing out the rare beauty of the words and accompaniment in a most delightful manner. The exhibits will remain in place for two weeks.
