### SAYS BROWN TROUT WOULD THRIVE IN SOUTH PALOUSE

Encouragement was lent this week to the campaign of local followers of Izaak Walton to find a game fish that would thrive in the warm waters of the South Palouse river when S. E. Land, fish expert with the Outdoor Life Publishing company, recommended the brown or "German" trout as a specie that would meet the local requirements. Other persons had previously recommended the brown trout for streams such as the South Palouse and this led to a further investigation. Mr. Land's recommendation is in answer to a request for information on the subject mailed to Outdoor Life by F. A. Masek. The question and answer, as published in the June issue of the magazine, is as follows:

We have three streams here which are now full of suckers and shiners with very few rainbows, which we want to stock with the brown trout variety. Will you tell me what you know about this fish?—F. A. Masek, Pullman, Wash.

I would recommend the brown trout of Europe or rainbow trout for streams you refer to. The rainbow and brown trout are both known as river trout, and are both good game fish. You need not worry about the suckers or shiners in your streams. The trout live on the young of all inferior fish found in streams that are suitable for the life of the trout. Trout are ravenous and voracious fishes. One is as much of a cannibal as the other, and brown trout are not any more so than the rainbow. All trout grow large when they are in large streams or lakes where there is plenty of food, such as the flesh of inferior fishes that belong to the minnow or sucker family. The brown trout is as much of an attraction for sportsmen who are rod and fly fishermen as the rainbow. The brown spawn in the fall and the rainbow spawn in the spring; they do not interfere with each other in any way in the same waters. You can get the eggs of the brown trout from the Commissioner of Fish and Fisheries, Washington, D. C.—S. E. Land.




