

The liberties of the American people are in danger, and a body blow has been struck at the great national game by Deputy Collector Breckinridge, of Kentucky, who has made a ruling that incomes over \$4000, which are derived from poker, horse racing or kindred sports, are subject to tax while corresponding losses cannot be deducted.

Peace has been proclaimed in the Orient and victorious Japan secures almost everything she asked for. Now the question arises as to where Ex-Secretary Charles Foster gets off. From the lack of commotion created by him as the representative of China, and the character of the terms of peace he evidently alighted at the water tank.

It is natural that Russia should not wish to see China surrender to Japan any territory on the eastern Asian continent, and it is likewise natural that France should sympathize with Russia in this matter. In this emergency it is pleasant to see that England is disposed to lend support to Japan. This makes the situation the east quite as interesting as it has been at any time heretofore.

General Freight Agent Fulton, of Portland, and Division Superintendent Gilbert, of Sprague, were visitors in the city yesterday. The object of the stay in Yakima was a conference with leading fruit men, whose demands or opinions as to the reductions in rates on certain fruit and farm products were listened to with attention and promised consideration. It is to be hoped the conference will prove beneficial in the way of freight rate reductions on this season's crop.

The revision of the tariff failed to paralyze that "infant industry," tin plate manufacturing, to the extent predicted by high tariff advocates. According to the report of Mr. John Jarrett, secretary of the Tin Plate Manufacturers association, there will be a surplus of 1,500,000 boxes of American tin this year for export. There are now in the United States 106 block plate tin mills completed and in operation, and 58 more in course of building or projected. The Cornish miner and manufacturer seems to have his optics completely knocked out under the operation of the Wilson bill.

The new weapons of warfare are becoming almost too destructive to admit of war. The Krag-Jorgensen rifle officially adopted for use in the United States army carries a destructive ball a distance of 5000 yards—nearly three miles. It was tested on the target range at Fort Leavenworth, the other day, and at a distance of 1500 yards—200 yards short of a mile—the bullet passed through a dead man's body and afterward went through two feet of solid oak. With these weapons and smokeless powder, contending armies could begin a battle while several miles apart, and the projectiles at a distance of a mile, would have force sufficient to pierce rank after rank and pass through half a dozen men ranged in line. This would make hostilities so deadly that even the bravest soldier would hesitate to put himself forward as a target unless death was courted by him.

Councilman Cox reminds THE HERALD that there is a city ordinance against the planting of Lombardy poplar trees on public streets. As one half of a recent shipment to this city for free distribution are Lombardy poplars, parents would do well to see that their children keep away from such varieties of public thoroughfares—as their planting would be a violation of the law. It is unwise, for other reasons, to plant poplars in private yards. Fruit men claim them to be full of aphids, and maintain that it is hard enough work to keep always spraying orchards, without allowing infested shade trees to be planted. Walls Walla long ago condemned the Lombardy poplar. That is, perhaps, the reason they have given away here in Yakima. It may be well not to plant any of these shade trees; because it is within the province of the state pest inspector to condemn them, if found at all infested, subject the planter to fine and order the trees cut down. Tree planters should remember that the orchards of this valley must be protected, and that it is a punishable misdemeanor to set out insect infested shrubs or trees.

Hop growers are this week being visited by a representative of Catlin & Fearn, a Seattle sub-contracting house, who has booked at least one contract at 8 cents. There are innumerable reasons why such a contract is to be deplored. A strong one appeals to local pride, and demands an answer to the query, why should hops be contracted at 9@9 1/2 cents by Lillenthal in Puyallup and only bring 8 cents in Yakima? Again, there isn't a grower in all Yakima county who can figure a profit on his crop if contracted at a cent less than 9 cents. Further, this tendency on the part of one or two growers to contract three or four tons, with a 1 cent advance of money, simply serves as a boomerang which, told to the world of buyers and growers, returns with telling force full upon the devoted head of every Yakima hop yard owner—and only disaster can result. It is utterly futile to assist in "bearing" a market which, even thus early, bids fair to be a rising one. A buyer would laugh at a grower's demand for 10@12@15 cents, when he could contract other hops as good at 8 cents. These unbusiness-like transactions should be at once abandoned. Hop culture and traffic is the life blood of the Yakima valley; why vitiate the fluid and bring debility and decay in the very germ of what promises this year to be most lusty and healthy fructification?

Preparations are going on for the Old Folks' concert, which will be given under the auspices of the Ladies' Aid society of the Presbyterian church, at Mason's opera house, May 22. There will be a chorus of 30 and an orchestra of 7 pieces. The costumes and songs as well will be those of 100 years ago, and the entertainment will no doubt be very interesting. A. G. Swindlehurst is director and Miss Grace Bunnell, accompanist.

Mr. T. W. Moore estimates that there are now 60 bicycles in use in Yakima. The purchasers during the past week were Dell Hancock, Sam Cameron, Miss Wilgus, Miss Staton of Fort Simcoe, and two others whose names Mr. Moore is pledged not to divulge until they perfect themselves in riding; but whom Mr. Moore says, "will be astonishers."

A 3-year-old Jersey bull attracted considerable attention on the street Monday, it having been shipped from Oregon and consigned to the Yakima Jersey Creamery company, of which N. M. Knappenburg is the manager. The animal is from Governor Moody's celebrated herd.

Lillie Smith, a frail dame known "on the rials" for the classic yet alleged to be pertinent pseudonym of "Whiskers," was vagg'd, in company with a male companion, by Constable Craig last night. The case comes up for trial before Justice Fulkerson this afternoon.

Two visiting sports, it is said, yesterday "took in" the crap game at E. W. Dooley's saloon to the tune of \$480. They arrived on the morning train and left at night, after curtailing the local circulating medium in the above amount.
