

Preparations on an Extended Scale Being Made to Welcome the People's Guest.

The various committees have been at work manfully to arrange order out of chaos and give Bryan a grand reception next Saturday. The chief guest will be here for twenty-four hours and the people will be given every opportunity, it is

hoped to greet and shake hands with the next president of the United States. The Roslyn band has been engaged to assist the home band being trained by Prof. Nagler. Upwards of \$400 have been collected and more in sight to defray the expenses. There will be a rostrum 12x12 feet erected on the south side of Larson's theater and seats fronting this on A street will be laid to accommodate as many ladies and elderly people as possible. Mr. Wroe, the artist, will paint a huge picture of Bryan, 5x6 feet, on canvas to be stretched across the avenue. It is expected that the stores and other public buildings will be decorated with bunting so as to make the occasion one of general hospitality. The Spokane Outburst (republican) speaking to this point says:

"Aside from the preparations being made by state committee officers and other prominent members of the democratic, populist and silver republican parties for the reception of William J. Bryan, some general action should be taken toward extending to him the cordial welcome of the whole city. It must be remembered that Mr. Bryan is coming to visit us all. The honor of his presence should not accrue entirely to his personal following in this vicinity, but should be shared among the people whom he comes to address. However we may approve or disapprove his attitude and argument in politics, Mr. Bryan is recognized as a man of national prominence and as such his visit here will be an event of general rather than mere party importance."

The committee has arranged for a banquet at the Hotel Yakima on Saturday night. Covers will be laid for 200 and the tickets will be \$1.50.

The committee on Tuesday night met to perfect further arrangements. It was agreed that Chairman Preble should have the honor of introducing Mr. Bryan. It was further agreed that covers should be laid for 200 at the Yakima and admission be placed at \$1.50. Mrs. Johnson will go to Tacoma for the purpose preparing for the feast, which she has determined shall befit the occasion and be an honor to the distinguished guest.

The committee passed the following resolution that is timely and appropriate: Whereas, Our city is to be honored by a visit on the 31st inst. of the distinguished citizen and orator, William Jen-

The Twin Parks.

F. W. Gilbert, of the N. P. Ry. Co., has been here this week from Spokane parking the depot grounds. Shade and fruit trees have been planted, gravel walks laid out and fountains planned. When completed the parks will be turned over to the city's care. The beauty spots will grow in beauty each added year.

A Public Building Needed.

The Commercial Club has reported, through a committee composed of Messrs. Larson, Sperry and Robertson, in favor of a government building to cost \$50,000. The government pays \$540 a year for a post office and \$240 for the land office. The fact is that many government officials are compelled to pay their own rent. Among the reasons urging an appropriation the committee says that in all probability the state will soon be divided into more than one federal district court field and North Yakima, being the chief city in central Washington, will naturally be the place selected for regular sittings of an additional court. The comparative bank deposits for three years are shown as follows: October, 1897, Yakima National Bank, \$244,482.79; First National, \$131,721.18; G. S. Hough, \$10,357. September, 1898, Yakima National, \$280,151; First National, \$183,823.14; G. S. Hough, \$14,683; September, 1899, Yakima National, \$362,165.95; First National, \$270,805; G. S. Hough, \$16,832.

The postoffice receipts for the year ending April 1, 1896, were \$6,032.35; for the year ending April, 1898, \$6,912.18; for the year 1899 the receipts were \$8,358.38, and for the year ending April 1, 1900, the estimate is placed at \$9,400. The money order business has doubled in the past four years. There are four brick store and office buildings in North Yakima the cost of which ranged from \$17,500 to \$25,000, and one sandstone that cost over \$19,000.

The estimated cost of suitable sites for a public building is placed at from \$3,000 to \$5,000.
