INDIAN WAS MURDERED.

Louis Charley Met With Foul Play, So Say His Friends.

Louis Charley, who was found dead last week near the railway tracks south of town, it is declared by his friends, was murdered, and Indian Jimmy and others are accused of the crime. Rev. George Waters of the reservation was in the city the first of the week and it is his opinion that the Indian was foully murdered. Charley was his son-in-law, and worked for Charles Olney near the fort. He came to town last week to attend the fair and had on his person considerable money. He had been drinking some, but not to excess and was returning home down the railway line. Three Indians, Jimmy, Salmon and the latter's brother were with Charley. The victim's money and horse disappeared and nothing has been heard of them since except the recovery of the saddle. Jimmy is charged with the crime for the reason that he acted suspiciously in the matter. Jimmy, says Mr. Waters, murdered an Indian four years ago and escaped to Oregon, but returned. Charley was a well respected Indian. He had a home near the M. E. church at the fort and leaves a wife and three children.

WORK OF COUNCIL.

All Bids for New Paving Rejected—They Were Too High.

The city council at its last meeting rejected all the bids for the paving of Front and First streets, now under consideration, and the city clerk was directed to readvertise again for bids on the same work. This action of the council was based on the fact that the bids were too high. There were but two bidders, to wit: C. E. Burlingame & Co. and William M. Kivor. The bids for the work on First street were first opened. Burlingame & Co's bid was \$3650 and McKivor's \$3,680. The Front street bids were, Burlingame & Co., \$6,125, and McKivor \$6,250. The difference in the price of the two streets is occasioned by there being one more block to macadam on Front than there is on First. This apparent difference however is the cause of council refusing the bids. The width of the macadam on First street is to be 68 feet and the cost of paving is about \$58 per lot, while on Front street the width is only 46 feet and the cost is almost \$55 per lot.

The following bids were received for changing the course of the Schanno ditch to make it run down Rainier avenue from C street to Yakima Avenue: Wm. McKivor, \$150; C. E. Meyers, \$209.50; G. T. Aumiller & Hines, \$325. The contract was let to the lowest bidder.

E. W. Dooley applied for a liquor license, but it was not granted for the reason that the application was irregular and not in accordance with the provisions of the ordinance. The mayor was instructed to grant the license when the defects in the paper were corrected.

Blanche Fauerbach presented a claim of \$250 as damages to her property as a result of cutting the water off her lots in block 67; claim rejected.

An ordinance to prevent hitching horses on Yakima avenue was read, but it was laid over till next meeting.

The street committee made a report accepting the work of C. E. Burlingame & Co. in macadamizing Yakima avenue.

City Marshal Boyle made a good report for the month of September and for the first week of October. During the month 200 arrests had been made and \$551.50 were collected in fines, as against \$150 for the same month in 1900. Fifteen persons were arrested for selling liquor to Indians and turned over to the county officials. Fifteen pickpockets were arrested during the week of the fair, eight of whom were picked up by Night Officer Starrett. Thirty-one cases were tried in the police court, all of the "sure thing" games in the city were suppressed and every precaution was taken to protect the people of the city and their visitors. The police have been very vigilant during the past week and merit praise for their energetic work in rounding up the criminals who always follow fairs.

Police Justice Lince reported \$520.70 as collected in fines during the month. The city treasurer reports \$9,481.61 as receipts for the quarter ending Sept. 30, 1901. Mayor Fechter made a verbal report to the effect that he had effected a compromise with the Quaker doctors and that they had left the city. The mayor said the city came out ahead in the deal with the Quakers.

City Engineer Marble made his report on the condition of the sewers of the city. Some of them are in bad shape, he said, and need attention at once. He recommended that the Natchez sewer be raised and relaid in the same place and the joints in the pipes cemented to prevent roots from interfering with the sewer.

The matter of better fire protection for the city was discussed at considerable length and it was finally decided to make it a special matter for consideration at the next meeting.

Councilman Weed made a motion that the city pay the expenses connected with bringing cots here and setting them up in the Switzer building for the entertainment of visitors at the fair. The amount of the costs in this connection was not given, so the majority of council refused to consider such a bill till they knew what the costs would amount to.

Councilman Hall called attention to the great amount of paper on the streets in violation of the ordinance. Clerk Doust was directed to have the ordinance printed and a copy presented to each business man in the city.

Dr. P. Frank asked for help to clean up the streets, which was granted.

J. E. Merwin reported that he would have all the numbering of the city completed by next week.
