### CHURCH NOTES.

Christmas will be celebrated this year in all the churches of the city with due and appropriate ceremonies. A great many Christmas trees will be used in celebration of the event by the families of the city and the surrounding country for the benefit of the little children, and a number of social functions have been arranged for. On the whole the Christmas of 1901 will be more generally and elegantly observed here than in years gone by. Announcements of the events at the different churches will be found below.

Christmas services will be conducted by Rev. J. Gihring of the German Evangelical church on Wednesday at 10:45 a. m. in the Adventist church on the west side.

The Christian church Sunday school will give the cantata, "Good Santa Claus" in the church Christmas eve. Good Santa will be present and participate in the festivities.

At St. Michael's church next Sabbath morning Rev. H. M. Bartlett will conduct the services and also give an account of his eastern visit. Mr. Bartlett will also preach in the evening at the usual hour.

On Christmas the St. Michael's Sunday school will give a festival and cantata entitled "A Good Time With Santa Claus."

The Presbyterian Sunday school will celebrate Christmas on Tuesday evening with a cantata entitled, "A Visit from Santa Claus." Special music will be a feature of the event together with a tree for the little folks. The performance will begin at 7 o'clock sharp so as not to detain the children to a late hour.

The Methodist Sunday school will celebrate on Tuesday evening at 7:30 o'clock with the usual Christmas program by the children assisted by the church choir. A Christmas tree will be the feature, loaded with treats for the members of the Sunday school. Superintendent B. F. Kumlir will be in charge of the exercises.

At the Congregational church on Tuesday evening there will be a Christmas tree for the children and a program carried out. Services will begin at 7 o'clock that the children may get home early before Santa Claus comes.

Special Christmas services will be observed at the Catholic church with the usual elaborations incident to the observance of the day by that denomination. A program of singing and entertainment has been arranged for the children at 10 a. m.
