

**INDIANS ARE GETTING TO BE BAD MEN**

**Jacob, an Old Policeman, Who Was Looking for a White Man, Assaulted by Inebriates.**

On the 24th day of last August in a house near Toppenish, the old Indian policeman, Jacob, was set upon by five drunken bucks and beaten into insensibility. He may not recover.

It seems that white men have been furnishing the Indians around Toppenish with plenty of booze, and a result the Indians have been painting things crimson.

Old Jacob thought he had located one of the white offenders, and proceeded to enter the house and make a search. He had no more than gotten inside when William Charley, Johnny George, Sam George, Yakima George and Jim Wallah-see assaulted him with deadly weapons and all but killed him. Chief of Police George Olney, of the reservation, heard of the affair and at once began an investigation, which resulted in the arrest of the above named Indians, who now await trial in the county jail. Agent Jay Lynch will prosecute the case to the full extent of the law, and it will undoubtedly go hard with the red boys. Tomorrow morning is the time set for trial.

**Lawrence.**

Charles E. Lawrence, the young man who accidentally shot himself through the stomach three weeks ago, died at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Lawrence, at Zillah, on Thursday afternoon last. The young boy's death is particularly sad, inasmuch as he was so highly respected for the many manly qualities he possessed. His friends watched anxiously for all signs of recovery, and at times believed that he would pull through, although the physicians in charge could see no hopes of his getting well and gave no encouragement whatever. The wound which resulted in Charley's death was from a 44-Caliber revolver which was in his coat pocket and which was accidentally discharged while he was attempting to put up his horse after coming in from a ride. The ball entered below the left fifth rib. Everything that medical aid could do was done for the young man and with remarkable fortitude he bore his misfortune, even when informed that it was only a question of a few days when he must go. He was conscious to the last and stated that he was prepared and willing to go if it was God's will. The funeral occurred on Saturday afternoon, attended by a large number of his young friends and the people of the neighborhood. Rev. M. J. Carmichael from Mt.


