County Commissioners.

The regular term of county commissioners began last Monday. The only business transacted was the election of W. H. Cline of Sunnyside as a successor to the late commissioner, Lafayette Pace, the auditing of current expense claims, and authorizing the county game warden to purchase 50 pairs of Chinese pheasants at a cost not exceeding \$350. The commissioners will meet again next Monday, Jan 11.

City School Notes.

The Summit View school building was seated and furnished this week, and will be opened for business next Monday. Three teachers will be employed in the building, but only Miss Odell, for principal, has been selected thus far. This building is calculated to accommodate nearly 200 pupils.

The Columbia school building is now complete and will relieve some of the pressure from over-attendance.

The total enrollment of the city schools for December was 1360, but many additions are expected for January. There was an increase of 100 in attendance in December this year over last.

Superior Court.

W. H. Perry was last Saturday granted a divorce from his wife, Mary J. Perry, on the ground of desertion. The case comes from Sunnyside.

The case of Thos. H. Walker vs. Alice E. Walker, from Sunnyside has been set for Jan. 18. The parties to this suit have brought their grievances from Wisconsin, where they were married in 1891. The husband charges infidelity, while the lady alleges abuse and cruelty in a cross-complaint.

The clerk has been instructed to see to the drawing of a petit jury, to be called for the term beginning Monday, Feb. 1. There are now over 30 criminal cases docketed and civil cases innumerable.

Mrs. Helen L. Pace has petitioned for letters of administration on the estate of her husband, the late County Commissioner Lafayette Pace. The value of the estate is placed at \$2500.

Investigating Land Officers.

E. B. Linnen, an agent of the interior department, arrived in this city Sunday to investigate charges against the register and receiver of the local land office. The charge against Receiver Cannon, so far as can be ascertained, is that he is holding too many positions. Mr. Cannon besides being receiver, is president of the Valley bank and general superintendent for eastern Washington of the St. Paul & Tacoma Lumber Co. As nearly as can be gleaned, Register Hinman is charged with having been elevated from the position of janitor of the court house at Ellensburg to his present position, with incompetency, and with unduly favoring his son, C. H. Hinman, in his practice before the local land office. Of course, the special agent is close-mouthed and nothing can be gleaned as to the probable outcome of the matter.

Yakima Fruit Co.

The prospectus of the Yakima-Washington Fruit Co. is in the hands of the public. This company proposes to plant an extensive orchard to apples, pears and peaches, comprising about 200 acres, and cultivate the same on the most approved methods. While the orchard is growing, melons, potatoes, onions and other crops will be cultivated and marketed.

The orchard will be located about one and one-half miles northwest of North Yakima, and will be irrigated by the waters of the Yakima Valley Canal Co. It will comprise about 200 acres—and will almost entirely be north slope and of moderate grade. The value of these last two items is well known to any orchardist—the first being necessary to guard against any possibility of frost, and the latter insuring a perfect irrigation system. In addition to the protection from frost afforded the orchard being located on a north slope, another fact should be mentioned at this point, viz.: the shelter from prevailing winds secured by the range of hills along the Cowiche river, north and west.

E. G. Peck is president of the company, Jay Yordy, of Tacoma, vice president; G. F. McAulay, vice president; O. A. Clark, secretary, and B. F. Kunler, treasurer.

The stock of the new company is being placed on the market, and it is expected the bulk of it will find its way into the hands of Yakima investors who readily see the large profits to be derived in an undertaking of the magnitude of this one. E. S. Price will handle the stock for the company.

CITY NEWS IN BRIEF.

Mr. Williams of Spokane, representing the Aetna Life Insurance Co., is in the city for a few days on business.

Henry C. Kohls left this morning for his old home place at Shakoep, where he will combine a little business with the pleasure of visiting his parents and other relatives.

Married, at the residence of the bride's parents, Altanum, Wash., December 23, 1903, by Rev. A. J. Smith, Mr. Warren E. Cole and Miss Neita Seward, both of Altanum.

The local democrats have decided to abandon any attempt to celebrate Jackson's birthday next Friday, but will probably take up the matter of honoring the natal day of Jefferson on April 2.

Deputy Marshal Short on Saturday arrested Frank Brown and Frank Seward on charges of selling whisky to Indians. The men were taken up near the southern city limits.

The rural telephone line up the Naches was opened up on Monday evening and the farmers along the route are enabled to talk over the system in North Yakima. The system has about 25 subscribers and extends up to the Jancek & Fechter ranch. It was put in by G. W. Bowlin for the Inland Telephone & Telegraph company. The farmers of Tappan are talking of such a line into their valley.

Mrs. Davies of the Spokane Home Finding association is in the city in the interests of her work. She reports the little ones taken from this place as all having been placed in beautiful homes, and as happy and contented as children can be. The association has purchased a large tract of land near Spokane and will soon commence the erection of a number of cottages. The first is to be called the "Yakima Memorial," and will cost in the neighborhood of \$3000.

U. S. Deputy Marshal Short has two Chinamen in his charge who are said to be unlawfully in the country. He went down on the Sunnyside ditch near Prosser, last Thursday and captured Hop Sing, who has been in this country for a number of years, and Hop was held by Commissioner Howlett for deportation, but gave notice of appeal. On Saturday Mr. Short picked up Lee Sang at the depot on account of a lack of papers showing his right to remain here. Lee's case will probably be heard today.

R. J. Curry lost a fine coat on Christmas day, someone taking it from his tailor shop while he was engaged in waiting on customers. Last Saturday the coat just as mysteriously reappeared at the shop although bearing sad evidences of having been worn by some individual not altogether particular of his personal appearances. Mr. Curry believes that the diligent inquiry and search for the missing garment was getting so warm that the would-be proprietor thought best to return it to its rightful place and save some embarrassing question later.
