**SENATOR ANKENY FAVORS  
EAST AND WEST DISTRICTS**

**Comes Out Squarely for Two Judicial Districts With Cascade Range as the Dividing Line.**

A Washington special to Sunday's Spokesman-Review says: "Senator Ankeny reached the city today, and in reply to a question concerning a judicial division of the state said the only proper division was the one proposed by Mr. Jones' bill, that is, a north and south line, making east and west districts. Heretofore it has been understood he favored north and south districts. He said the entire east part of the state seemed to be united for the first named division, and, if necessary to make the business of the proposed districts more equal, the eastern district could take in a few of the river counties, such as Cowlitz, Wahkiakum, etc."

**Legality of the Poll Tax.**  
As the assessor will soon be around to collect poll tax, the following dispatch from Olympia, dated last Thursday, will be of interest:  
United States Collector of Customs C. W. Ide has instituted a suit in the supreme court to test the constitutionality of the state law providing for the collection of a poll tax.  
The case reached the supreme court from Jefferson county and the law was attacked on the ground that it is not in accord with the state constitution which provides for uniformity of taxes.  
Mr. Ide, through his attorney, holds that as the poll tax can be collected only from males within a certain age limit, discrimination is made by the act.  
The case will be watched with interest by attorneys throughout the state and road district supervisors.
