SUPERIOR COURT CONVENED IN THIS CITY LAST MONDAY

An Unusually Long List of Cases on the Calendar--Twelve of Them Are Criminal--Court Notes.

The regular November term of district court convened in this city Monday morning. The calendar, as will be seen from the list of criminal and civil cases given below, is unusually long, and the term will doubtless be a lengthy one. All the jurors on the venire were present except three, who could not be found by the sheriff in serving summons. P. J. Oleson was excused from duty on account of deafness, Charles Porter because of illness, and H. Restleff on account of private business demanding immediate attention.

The first case was that of Harriett B. and Herbert G. Freeman vs. F. H. Gloyd et al. an action on contract. The real defendant in the case is H. P. Varmilye, Mr. Gloyd, who is the banker at Prosser, having merely received the money involved in a certain real estate transaction and delivered papers left with the bank in escrow. The plaintiffs, it appears, had purchased from the defendant six sections of land under the Sunnyside canal. Since the payment of the money in question, it is alleged that the defendants have discovered that two of the sections transferred to them were not the sections they were shown. The aid of the court is invoked in settling the difficulty.

W. H. KARR'S BODY FOUND.

Was Lashed to the Boat on Which He Was Last Seen Alive.

It will be remembered that in the issue of the Herald of November 16th it was stated that word had just been received in this city that William H. Karr, son of the founder of Hoquiam, Wash., had been drowned while out hunting. The father, James A. Karr, and a brother, L. Z. Karr, living on Nob Hill, left at once for Hoquiam, and after they had been there a few days wrote to the family here that no trace of the body had been found. Hope of seeing the unfortunate young man alive again had then been abandoned, but the search for his remains was still kept up. The following dispatch in Monday's Tacoma Ledger tells of the finding of the body:

"The body of W. H. Karr, who was drowned in the waters of Grays Harbor on election day while out hunting, was found today on the ocean beach near Damons point. James Avey, who has been searching for the unfortunate man's

remains since the accident, found the body tied to the boat on which he was last seen alive drifting seaward. A reward of \$250 was offered for the recovery of the body, which Avey will get. The body was brought to this city and interment will be made here Wednesday." The deceased was 28 years of age, and had acquired considerable property. He was to have been married on the evening of the day following the accident.

A Timely Suggestion.

A gentleman who is familiar with modern ideas in connection with civic improvement in the eastern cities states to the Herald that in his opinion it is a mistake on the part of the city to build the present narrow crossings in the business portion of the city. It has been demonstrated that wider crossings last longer, and the added convenience to pedestrians in passing on the crossings, particularly when the streets are crowded, is certainly a strong argument in their favor.

Sidewalk Badly Needed.

The attention of the Herald has been called to the troublesome and provoking condition of the street in the vicinity of the depot. From the end of the sidewalk on the east side of Front street to the depot platform, about half a block, a square of black, sticky mud exists after every rain, and through this slush and water the public is compelled to wade, the alternatives being a walk down to the track on the south side of Yakima avenue, and thence on the ties to the station platform, or hire a hack

to carry them there. A short strip of walk would bridge the chasm, so to speak, and the public would certainly appreciate it very much.

Back from Eastern Trip.

H. H. Allen returned Monday evening from a two months' trip through the central eastern states. In addition to doing the world's fair and the city of St. Louis thoroughly, he also visited Chicago, Minneapolis and other cities. The times are good in all the localities in which he stopped, he states, and everybody seems happy and contented. It has been a remarkably mild winter up to the present time in the Mississippi valley, and very little snow has fallen. The weather was quite cold when he left Minneapolis, but the only snow he saw on the return trip, aside from that on the highest mountains, was in the Dakotas.
