#### WHEAT CROP IMMENSE.

A Probable Gain of More Than Ten Per Cent Over 1904. Wheat harvesting in eastern Washington has progressed far enough to enable railroad men who keep in close touch with the crop statistics to form nearly, if not absolutely accurate estimates of the probable yield for 1905. Joseph McCabe, vice president and general manager of the Washington & Columbia River Railroad Company, with headquarters in Walla Walla, said to a reporter for the Seattle Times a few days ago that undoubtedly this year would see the greatest grain crop in the entire history of the state. Mr. McCabe believes that the crop will nearly reach 30,000,000 bushels in eastern Washington. Estimates for last year, made by well-informed observers, placed the crop at 27,000,000 bushels in round figures. Mr. McCabe, whose position gives him special opportunities to make careful and comprehensive estimates, says that there is every reason to believe that the crop of 1905 will show a gain in yield over last year of from 10 to 12 1/2 per cent. On this figuring, it is evident that the state will be richer by between \$18,000,000 and \$20,000,000 as a result of the wheat crop for 1905 alone. This is based on the present price of wheat.

#### CAUSE OF A CONDITION.

People Do Not Buy Goods Except Upon Solicitation.

Merchants in a certain northwest town have discovered that one-third of the money orders which go through their local postoffice are sent to retail mail order houses, says the Minneapolis Bulletin and Trade. On the other hand there are many towns where little if any money is sent to mail order houses. Much depends upon the merchants themselves. A great deal depends upon the enterprise of each individual merchant. A great deal can be accomplished toward heading off this mail order business by merchants working together, and the time is here when meeting mail order competition is a case of eternal vigilance. A good authority puts it just about right when he says that in meeting mail order competition, or devising ways and means to do it the local merchant should ask himself why the farmer buys from mail order houses. Why does he? Because the man who writes the mail order advertising cleverly deceives him into thinking he can buy goods cheaper than anywhere else. He baits the hook with some low prices. If the farmer is to be undecieved, how is the local merchant to get at it? There is but one way—vigilance, industry and advertising that give the figures and as much as possible the pictures which can be looked over while the farmer is sitting around the hearthstone. It is easy to theorize on how this competition should be met, but behind the counter the problem looms up as one of those everlasting things which the merchant has with him every day and every hour. He must combat wrong impressions by whatever methods he finds the most effective. The general verdict among successful merchants is that good advertising is one of the best arrows in the merchant's quiver.

#### INDIANS CANNOT BUY WHISKEY.

Reservation Agents Instructed to Enforce State Laws Rigidly. The commissioner of Indian affairs has written letters to all the Indian agents in Washington instructing them to see that the penalties of the state law in reference to the sale of liquors to Indians be enforced. As a result of a recent decision of the United States Supreme court, declaring that allotted Indians are citizens, it has been apparently inferred by some of the saloon men as well as Indians that there is no law prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors to such Indians. In a letter to the attorney-general, Charles M. Buchanan, superintendent of the Tulalip Indian reservation, quotes from a letter from the acting commissioner of Indian affairs, as follows: "As the allotted Indians are now declared to be citizens in the full meaning of the term, and are subject to the laws of the state in which they reside, and seem to be anxious to enjoy all the rights and privileges of citizenship, you will see that they endure the penalties of the law as well, and that the statute prohibiting the sale of liquors to Indians is enforced." In the letter received by the attorney general the section of the penal code of this state making it a misdemeanor to sell or give liquor to Indians is quoted, and Mr. Buchanan asks for information as to the method of enforcing such laws. The attorney general will advise him to confer with prosecuting attorneys of the counties where violations occur, and arrange for the swearing out of warrants or informations against the violators.
