### NATCHES.

The excursion to Naches City was well attended. One hundred and sixty came up on the train, and a number of others came by buggy and automobiles.  
The Naches City Tigers crossed bats with the Tampico team Sunday. Owing to the high wind the score ran high, the result being 21 to 7 in favor of the Tigers. The home team outbatted and outfielded the visitors. The feature of the game was the home run by A. H. McPhee.

### Dismisses Eleven Water Cases.

Eleven of the Ahtanum water cases were dismissed in the superior court Thursday by Judge Kauffman. The court ruled that the court commissioner abused his discretion in issuing a restraining order, returnable in 28 days. The cases were based on the restraining order issued by the court commissioner.  
The relator in the cases dismissed was David Munn. The contempt cases are the outcome of a suit started August 8 in equity to prevent the ranchers from using water from the Ahtanum creek. On the same date the suit was commenced a restraining order was issued by the court commissioner enjoining the defendants in the case from using the water during the action. When this order was issued the judge of the superior court was out of town and would not return until September 5, and the commissioner therefore issued the order, returnable on September 5.  
During the summer months the ranchers were in need of water and, it is stated, violated the restraining order, and action was therefore started for contempt.  
Judge Kauffman stated that the commissioner had abused his discretion in issuing the order and he would therefore reverse it by annulment. Attorneys for the plaintiff argued that it was impossible to secure a show cause order for immediate hearing. The court replied that the attorneys for the plaintiff should have notified the governor and secured a special judge to hear the cases.  
When court opened Attorney Hatfield for the plaintiff asked that the case be continued until Monday. The court agreed upon a continuance if the attorneys for the plaintiff would pay all costs up to next Monday. Attorney Hatfield informed the court that they would not be willing to consider such a proposition and they would continue the cases.  
The cases dismissed were against the following persons: C. P. Moore, Charles Anderson, Gertrude Hecke, Charles Eglin, Fred Hecox, W. H. Peatross, F. Montz, Mrs. Augusta Roberts, Sherman Eglin, Charles Anderson and H. Knox.  
In all probability these cases will be appealed to the supreme court. The cases against Andrew Slavin, Joseph Mondor, E. A. Shanfelt, W. J. Hackett, George Eglin and John W.

Shaw, in which H. L. Bergeson is relator, will come up for trial today. On account of Attorney H. J. Shively being detained in Boise, Idaho, Attorney W. M. Thompson has been retained by Attorney Hatfield to assist in the cases.

### ASSEMBLY CLOSES SESSIONS, Church of the Nazarene Makes Appointments of Pastors.

The assembly of the Church of the Nazarene for the states of Washington and Idaho closed its sessions Tuesday and the pastors left for their homes, some to take up work in other fields. The session here was a most interesting one from many standpoints. There were sixteen additions to the church and twelve seekers for sanctification. The work of the church has been greatly encouraged by the unusual interest displayed. 
