LANDS ARE SURVEYED.

Government Plat for Sections Along Columbia River to Be Filled.

Twelve sections of United States government land, which has been

withdrawn from entry, has been surveyed, according to announcement of Register Harry Y. Saint and Receiver Alfred C. Steinman. The land is located near White Bluffs in township 12, north range 27, E. W. M., and has been withdrawn from entry since December 28, 1905, under the reclamation act. Persons who have settled on the land prior to December 25, 1905, are advised to file applications within 90 days from the filing of the plat, March 30, 1909, in order to protect settlement rights. The land is under the Benton project.

GAME DID NOT WORK.

LONDON, Feb. 23.—"Human letters" were dispatched to Premier Asquith this afternoon by inventive women suffragettes. Mrs. Drummond and Mrs. Parkhurst went to the Strand postoffice and asked if it was possible to express "human letters," and were answered in the affirmative. They went out and brought in two of their colleagues, Mrs. McLellan and Mrs. Parsons, and addressed them to the premier's residence. The two women were at once dispatched by special messenger. Servants at the premier's residence refused to accept the delivery of the suffragist mail and the police quickly cleared the women out of the district.

HERRICK WON'T ACCEPT.

Frank McVeagh Now Appears to Be Next in Line.

NEW YORK, Feb. 23.—Former Governor Herrick will not be secretary of treasury in the Taft cabinet. In a statement issued by Judge Taft today, after a conference with Herrick, it is stated that in December Herrick told Taft he would not be able to accept the position because his business engagements prevented. The elimination of Herrick seems to put Franklin McVeagh of Chicago in the lead for the place, but Taft said it would be several days before the matter would be settled.

COURT OF INQUIRY.

Innocent Brownsville Soldiers May Be Reinstated.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—President Roosevelt is authorized to appoint a court of inquiry to determine the qualifications for re-enlistment of the discharged negro soldiers accused of shooting up Brownsville. The Aldrich bill for this purpose was passed by a party vote of 50 to 26, except that Teller voted with the republicans. The bill is a compromise approved by the president, Senator Foraker and all republican members of the committee on military affairs. The court of inquiry will act as a board to consider the applications for enlistment and recommend the restoration of such soldiers as are found innocent of complicity in the affair.

TOO MANY FARMERS.

Discovered on Jury in Standard Oil Case.

CHICAGO, Feb. 23.—The re-trial of the Standard Oil Co. of Indiana was unexpectedly delayed today when Judge Anderson of the federal court quashed a panel of 150 veniremen because of the predominance of farmers on it. It was a farmers jury which brought in the verdict making Judge Landis' \$29,000,000 fine possible. Anderson stated that "It looks like a desire or is a strange coincidence." He said he did not want to start a trial feeling that something was not quite fair.
