A BOON TO YAKIMA.

The recent visits of Northern Pacific officials to North Yakima show that the importance of this section on the railroad map has assumed a place of higher significance. The building of a new passenger station, the improving of the train service and train equipment, together with the provision for a faster freight service both ways, makes it appear that a few of the troubles which have beset the people of the Yakima valley in the past, are about to disappear, at least temporarily.

Furthermore, an announcement that will be of importance to the people of this locality during the present season is that all excursion and special rate passenger tickets will provide a stopover privilege for North Yakima. That will permit of this community's taking advantage of the immense traveler traffic to and from the exposition.

The immense output of fruit and especially of the perishable varieties, in the Yakima valley has served to bring home to the people of this section that no more serious problem confronted them than the speedy transportation of freight. For this class of produce, not only is it required that plenty of cars may be had, but it is necessary also that these loaded trains be moved to their destination rapidly.

The fruit grower is a specialist. He depends entirely upon his fruit returns for his existence and his profits. He is under a large expense to care for his orchard and harvest his crop and in the event that this harvested product is damaged or allowed to spoil for want of speedy transportation to market, his resources for the season have been dissipated and his efforts and his money in securing it wasted.

Many of the growers, realizing the seriousness of the situation with the many acres of new orchards coming into the producing stage, have expressed fear that some such a calamity might befall Yakima and many have voiced the opinion that it would require the utmost capacity of the present road as well as the utmost capacity of the North Coast at an early date, to handle the produce from this point during the shipping season. The advent of new roads and the renewed life of the Northern Pacific have not arrived any too early for the highest welfare of Yakima.

MAKE RANGES INTO FARMS

Passing of One Time Flourishing Industry—6400 Acres for Farms and Tracts.

ELLENSBURG, March 1.—One of the final events marking the passing of the stock business in this section of the state took place yesterday when the stockholders of the Horse and Cattle Range association of Ellensburg voted to disband. The 36 shareholders decided to relinquish the claim they have on 22 sections near this city. The association owns outright 3400 acres, and the remaining 12 sections are owned by the state and under lease by the association.

The land owned by the association is mostly suitable for grazing. However, there is considerable timber and a part of the big tract may be turned into farms and grain land. The land owned by the state is similar.

The natural rise in the value of land and the decrease in the value of range stock made disbandment necessary. According to the members of the company the development of the state has made other pursuits more profitable.

SECTION OF TIETON SELLS FOR \$26,000

John D. Nichols Sells Section 7 to Local People—Three Purchasers for the Property.

The sale of section 7 of the Tieton ray lands was consummated on Friday afternoon when John D. Nichols sold to F. J. Mullins and Walter McLaren, the latter a well known rancher of the Naches valley, a section of land comprising 640 acres of the government land coming under the new government Tieton canal.

This land was originally owned by the Ditter-Bartholet company and was sold to Mr. Nichols about the middle of December for \$19,000. The consideration in the present transaction was \$26,000, an enhancement in value during two months of over \$7000.

Several prospective buyers were desirous of securing the property and the close of the sale was something in the nature of a land lottery, there being three other parties seeking the plum. Other large deals in Tieton land are in prospect and will probably be announced within a week.

IS VALUABLE DOLLAR.

H. C. Lucas Has One of Five "Trade Dollars" in Existence.

H. C. Lucas, vice president of the Yakima Trust Co., is the possessor of a rare and valuable coin, a "Trade" dollar, minted in 184. The coin is reported to be one of five coins of the variety that are now in existence, and a counterpart of the one owned by the North Yakima banker brought over \$200 when put up for auction in an eastern city. Some time ago Vice President Lucas had two of the coins but he let Fred Schaefer, manager of the Yakima theatre, have one at a nominal figure. Now neither of the Yakima men would part with the dollar for a small figure, though the actual value of the silver is considerably less than a dollar.

INSANE SWEDS IS COMMITTED

Floods Jail With Water and Requires Five Men to Handle Him in His Insane Frenzy.

John Hope, the insane Swedish laborer who has been furnishing excitement for the sheriff's office the past week, was committed to the insane asylum at Medical Lake Saturday afternoon by Judge Preble. There seems to be some doubt as to the name of the unfortunate man. While working at Priest Rapids he was known as John Hupper. Papers belonging to the man would indicate that his name was L. F. Leeck, and he was committed under the name of John Hope.

In an insane frenzy Saturday morning Hope turned on the water in his cell and began to yell and curse. The water from the running tap flooded the jail kitchen and Deputy

Kaufman went to Hope's cell to quiet him. He was splashed with water by Hope. Other deputies and officers, attracted by the hub bub, were given a shower by Hope, who kept up a constant yelling and cursing. Finally the water in the main pipe was shut off by a Northwest Light & Water Co. employe and Hope became quiet.

In an effort to get Hope to dress in order to appear in court another row was started and it required the efforts of five men to hold him and place him in a straight jacket.

A man who is acquainted with conditions in railroad camps along the Columbia believes Hope to be a victim of the cocaine habit. He says that cocaine eating is prevalent among the laborers in the railroad camps and that he knows of three cases where men have become insane through eating and snuffing the drug. Nothing is known of Hope's relatives or past.
