CONDEMNS ASSOCIATION OF MANUFACTURES FOR INCONSISTENCY

NEW YORK, May 26.—The arraignment
ment of organized labor, made here in
his speech of acceptance by John Kirby
of Dayton, Ohio, the newly elected presi-
dent of the National Association of
Manufacturers, is condemned by John
Mitchell, former president of the Mine
Workers of America, in an article pub-
lished in the current issue of the Na-
tional Civic Federation Review.

"Paradoxical as it may appear," says
Mr. Mitchell, "the representatives of
this employers' association in one breath
decry and denounce what they term
