While the polls will be open all day next Tuesday the various candidates will all breathe a little easier if you vote early in the morning.

The ideal union in some peoples imagination is a sort of mutual aid association society that discusses Brownings and serves tea and cakes at the meetings. No such union ever added a dollar to the day's pay or shortened the hours of labor.

How long is it going to take Mrs. Blanche Mason to gather the evidence in the case of the Supply Laundry people in Seattle, and what is Mr. Hubbard going to do with it when he gets it? We might also ask whether the office of state labor commissioner is for the protection of the working people or the large employers of labor.

Every little while Mr. Post, of Battle Creek, breaks into the columns of the daily press with a tirade of abuse against union labor and calls on the dear people to help him break up the awful labor trust. Inasmuch as there are some twenty different unions and a central body in his own home city, it would seem that there was a field for his endeavors in "home mission work."

A certain judge in Boston, Mass., recently fined a painter's local for threatening to strike. This is the law of injunction carried to its logical conclusion and as an exchange tersely puts it, "the next step will be an injunction against the members of a labor union even thinking of striking." It needs but the abolition of trial by jury in criminal proceedings—and this, too, is being advocated by prominent legal lights—to place the working people at

solately at the mercy of the judiciary. And yet we keep right on voting for men and parties that stand for such a tyrannical form of government.

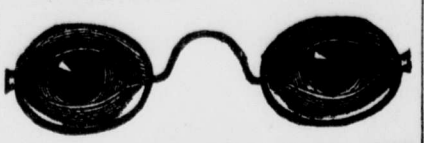
