### A. M. YOST VERY ILL AT LEAVENWORTH

### EDMONDS MAN STRICKEN WHILE ON AUTO TOUR—ALTIITUDE AND HEAT BLAMED (From Everett Herald)

News has reached Everett of the probable fatal illness of A. M. Yost, of Edmonds, who is in a hospital at Leavenworth, east of the mountains, suffering from an attack diagnosed as paralysis of the brain. Yost, with his family, left Edmonds last week for a tour through the eastern part of the state by auto. Late Saturday he collapsed, and was taken to the hospital in an unconscious condition, from which he has rallied. The breakdown is attributed to a combination of high altitude in the summer mountains and the heat east of the hill tops. Yost is one of the wealthiest men in Snohomish county. He is the owner of the Edmonds waterworks system and an extensive property holder there. Always has been prominent in the affairs of that community, and he is widely known throughout the county.

### ULONSKA SCORES HEAVILY

North Yakima, Wash., August 15, 1915.  
Dear Comrade Shipley:  
Comrade Ulonska arrived here last Saturday afternoon and we held a street meeting in the evening with over 400 people present. He was well received by the audience. About \$2.50 worth of literature was sold.

Heretofore the police have either made a street speakers stop speaking or have compelled them to move a block from the main avenue. So we applied for a permit to speak on the avenue, which of course they refused us. But we were not to be so easily deprived of our rights, so we selected the best place on the avenue and started speaking to a large crowd that the Salvation Army had been kind enough to collect for us.

The patrolman on the beat soon hove in sight and when he saw what was going on telephoned to headquarters for orders. But evidently these, gallant protectors of the peace had cold feet, for they did not molest us.

Sunday Comrade Ulonska spoke at the courthouse to about 375 people, many of whom came to hear their first Socialist lecture. And here let me say that I had rather have one Henry Dubblisten to Ulonska than any other Socialist I have ever heard. He has a clear convincing manner and a thorough understanding of his subject. During his two-hour talk not a person left the room. We had challenged two old-party politicians to debate, but they did not show up.

We issued a challenge again at the meeting, which was accepted by a young man living here, and we hope to arrange for the debate soon.

I secured two subs for the N.W.W. at the meeting.

We have added thirteen new members to the Local at the last meeting, and have six to be acted upon at the next. Within a week there will be at least ten more, due I am sure, to Ulonska's good work here.
