MORE ABOUT OUR LAMENTED COMRADE A. M. YOST

Dear Editor:—Most of the reports printed in the daily papers regarding the life and death of our beloved comrade, Allen M. Yost, are wrong. Here are the facts:

While returning home from his motor trip through Eastern Washington they had tire trouble. After this was remedied, Comrade Yost got into his machine. He began to feel dizzy and reached out to close the door of the machine and groped around blindly. His wife asked him why he didn't close the door and he said, "I guess I ate too many peaches."

He then sank into unconsciousness, which the doctor declared afterwards to be apoplexy. As they were near Leavenworth at the time, he was taken to the hospital there. The doctors gave little hope for his recovery, and after two days he passed away without becoming conscious.

His body was brought to Edmonds and the funeral was held in the opera house.

Comrade Rev. W. H. Parr gave the funeral address to a large crowd of comrades and friends of the deceased. After this the body was taken to Seattle for cremation.

Comrade Yost leaves a loving wife and a host of friends and relatives to mourn his death. Many are the little children who will miss the ice cream cones the comrade used to buy them at Socialist picnics.

Allen M. Yost was born in 1856 in Sancon Township, Northampton County, Pennsylvania, away out in the country. In 1875 he was married to Amanda C. Roth, and for a few years worked in the Bethlehem steel mills. After that they moved to Kansas where they stayed three years, moving to Edmonds, Wash., in 1890. He arrived here practically penniless, but through thrift and good fortune managed to have much property and money at the time of his death. Comrade Yost has been a loyal member of the Socialist Party here since 1902. He always aided the party financially and every other way.

At the time of his death Mr. Yost was owner of the Edmonds Opera House and was identified either directly or indirectly with many of Edmond's enterprises, being president of the Edmonds Spring Water Co., and Edmonds Independent Telephone Co. He had large interests in the Yost Auto Co. and the Edmonds Lumber Co.

Comrade Yost was ever ready to serve in the cause of Socialism not only with his money, but with his personal services wherever needed. Yours for the revolution,
