The vote on Referendum "H" 1916 (to dispense with 1917 state convention) was tallied in the State Office on January 3rd. The motion carried with 516 voting yes and 254 no. The votes of Locals Aberdeen No. 2 (Fin.), 7 yes and 16 no; Hoquiam No. 1, 10 yes; Oakesdale, 5 yes, and White Salmon, 6 yes—a total of 29 yes and 16 no—could not be counted because they had not reported for the month of November.

**FARMERS FOOLED**  
 Outlook, Wash., Dec. 21, 1916.  
 Editor Northwest Worker:  
 At many times in the past, the money question has been one which has attracted a great deal of attention. Such political parties as the Greenback and People's parties made it one of their chief issues, and gained some success by electing members to Congress and other public offices. On every occasion when said parties got large enough to be a menace to the power that be, they managed to sidetrack the main issue for some minor question, and by getting the consent of some of the leaders to accept a "half loaf" were enabled to disrupt said parties and in the time destroy them.

The money question for all that is a great one. The Socialist platform is the only one of all the present political parties which advocates the true remedy to overthrow usury and the power of the banker. Read that plank in the National platform, and if you wish to fully understand the various steps by which the bankers have obtained that power, you can read of them in "The Conspiracy of the House of Morgan" written by Comrade H. L. Locke of Watertown S. D., price 65c paper cover. The hypocrisy of the leaders of the old parties and their betrayal of the people in the Federal Reserve Bank Act, and the Rural Credits Act is fully shown. History repeats itself and we find Grange leaders opposing the only party whose platform on the questions are like the Grange resolutions on the subject and leading their followers into the Democratic camp after a fake so-called Rural Credits Act. In 1896 the Farmers Alliance plans on the money question were betrayed by the free silver movement led by Bryan, and we then saw leading Populists and Farmers Alliance men consenting to the so-called "half-loaf." The result was we never got even the "half-loaf."

It is not my intention at this time to enter into a discussion of the money question which is an important part of the economic question. Should anyone desire to be fully informed on the question I recommend Comrade Loucks book.

No doubt, many Comrades, who like myself, lived in South Dakota at one time, remember Comrade Loucke as the President of the State and National Farmers Alliance, and the Peoples party candidate for Governor in 1890. He is a deep student of economic questions.
