Friends of Allan G. Mason Pleased at His Release.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 11.—When Allan G. Mason, accused of being the murderous "Jack the Huger," was brought in the court this morning an immense crowd awaited him.

He was immaculately dressed but handcuffed, and when called to the bar was pale but composed.

Upon opening the case District Attorney Saunders immediately said: "I am fully satisfied that I have not sufficient evidence to hold the president and get a jury to sustain the charge of murder, so I will, therefore, ask that he be discharged from custody."

The court granted the request without comment, while the spectators attempted applause, but the demonstration was promptly suppressed.

Mason received warm congratulations from his society friends. The hearing required just two minutes.

PRESIDENT BAER DENIES EVERYTHING

General Refutation of All of the Arguments of the Mine Workers' President.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—Labor Commissioner Carroll D. Wright made public this morning President Baer's answer to the report of John Mitchell, president of the United Mine Workers. It is a general denial of each clause of Mitchell's statement.

He denies that there is any similarity in the present conditions of anthracite and bituminous mining. He thinks wages are sufficient to offset the increased cost of present American methods of living.

TRESPASS

James Anderson, who was arrested on Nov. 7 for trespassing, has had his hearing and evidently it was an unusual scene.

Anderson was possessed of an idea he owned a certain residence in the city and went to the place, ordered the people out and took possession, claiming that he had a lien on the property.

Anderson claims that the property belongs to him and is anxious for his trial, in order that he may move back.

BREVITIES.

A. D. McCarthy, prominent in railroad circles at Kallispell, accompanied by his little daughter, was at the Chicago hotel today.

Continuing, he says that no children are employed at a younger age than provided by law, and sums up by saying that any increase in wages means a corresponding increase in the price of coal to the public and would seriously affect all industries using anthracite to compete with those using bituminous.

He characterizes the United Mine Workers as a primarily bituminous organization, and that bituminous coal has competed with anthracite ever since the advent of the order and that conditions have been rendered intolerable through decreased discipline. Strikes have been almost a daily occurrence and the men work-tageous and profitable employment.
