EDWARD'S GORGEOUS BOAT.

State Barge in Which the King Will Row on the Thames—Ornamented With a Crown and the Royal Arms in Gilt.



LONDON, Nov. 12.—King Edward's state barge is likely to be a picturesque addition to the royal glories of next summer. The ancient craft, built 213 years ago, and used by many English kings and queens, was completely restored last spring, and it was expected that it soon would be seen, propelled by its richly clad "watermen," passing up and down the Thames as often as the barges of Elizabeth and Charles II. used to be.
