

# UNION WILL NOT ADMIT THE LADY BARBERS

The Ladies Stand for Union Hours and Prices and the Union Does Not Fight Them.

The lady barbers of Spokane do not belong to the barbers' union. "We can't," said a lady barber this morning. "The union refuses to recognize an application for membership of a lady engaged as a barber."

"Are you in sympathy with organized labor?" was asked.

"We are, and you will understand our feeling in the matter when I tell you that we keep union hours on week days as well as Sundays and we uphold union prices."

The lady barbers take the position that the work is as suitable

for a lady as it is for a man and that the profession is not being endangered by the lady barbers.

One of the ladies about to resume operations on a face turned to the reporter and said: "It's up to them, if they want to bar us from the organization."

The union shops claim it is not a local issue and that they personally have no feeling in the matter. The organization as a body decided upon the course of excluding females from membership after much consideration, but owing to no personal antagonism. The union makes no fight on the lady shops.

The Federal union presented grievances against the Union Ice company and Mr. Spoor for refusing to hire union help and stating that he did not desire the support of union help in any way. As a result Mr. Spoor was placed on the unfair list.

The Norden hotel was taken off the unfair list. The cooks and waiters' union notified the assembly that the hotel had resolved to comply with their demands.

Hereafter the arbitration committee will be remunerated for time spent in promoting the interests of the council.

No definite decision was made at last night's meeting, although the matter was freely discussed, but a final report will probably be given at the next meeting by the committee on buildings and grounds and by the ways and means committee of the council.

There is not sufficient money in the treasury to support such extensive improvements as are needed, and it will therefore be necessary to decide whether the city should be bonded or make direct assessment.

The school auditorium on the upper floor, as well as two other rooms adjoining it, are being utilized, although they were never intended for that purpose and are but poorly lighted by a skylight.

The board of trustees has given up its room and every available space in the basement also has been devoted to furnish seating capacity.

Professor W. C. Slyver, president of the school board, stated that they had always been behind time in building heretofore, and he should urge the board to take decisive measures for the erection of the addition at the earliest opportunity.

The addition proposed consists of two wings and will involve the expenditure of practically \$50,000. This arrangement would provide ample capacity for at least five years.


