

# PASTOR FRY STRIKES AT TRADE UNIONISM

## Inveighs Against Organized Labor--Sees Ruin in Its Present Course.

At the morning service yesterday in the Jefferson St. Methodist church the pastor, Rev. W. H. Fry, spoke on "Two Social Giants," labor and capital.

He touched very lightly on capitalism. The substance of his address on this point was that we cannot become a great nation without capital and great capitalists. But that the greed of the capitalists was like the greed of organized labor, the one wants greater wages and the other greater dividends, and thus they destroy the social opportunities of the people.

His address on organized labor was especially severe on those who believe in the principle.

He said that the moral aspect showed that the union man held an intense hatred for the non-union man and, though he believed in sending missionaries to foreign countries, they were more needed here.

"Labor organizations are more powerful than capital, but the spirit of strife and hatred is going to lead this country to immeasurable ruin. I pity the labor unions for their misdirected energy. It does not make of its members sons of liberty, but makes them paupers, spongers, dynamiters and worse. They are sons of a rush. They breed anarchy and strife.

"One of the best ways to solve the problem is through our children. Economy will raise the standard of wages. Honesty and character are always at a premium. We are a wasteful nation.

"If the labor agitator would spend less of his time in the saloon brooding over his lot and more of his time in the house of God it would be so much better for him."

### REORGANIZE STAFF.

#### URGED BY THE SECRETARY OF WAR'S REPORT.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—Publication was made today of the annual statement of the secretary of war.

Within the next 30 days the complete reduction of the army to the standard prescribed by the order of October 24, 1902, which will bring the number of men enlisted now in the Philippines to 33,480. The remainder of the enlisted force, including troops stationed at Peking and Alaska, will be 46,386, giving a total roll call for the army of 59,866 men.

The report contains some interesting information on the needs of the army, the principal of which is the reorganization of the headquarters staff, which is practically the brain of the army and would have for its chief duties the determining of the composition of the force in time of war, the conduct of campaigns and the obtaining of information about the movements of our prospective enemies.

The secretary urges the passage of the Hawley-Dick bill dealing with the militia and state national guards. If this bill becomes law, the standing army of 60,000 could be instantaneously increased to 250,000 well trained men should a war be thrust upon us, while the expense connected with the raising of these troops would be less than the maintenance of 10 additional regiments.

The bill also provides for the rearmament of the national guards so that there will be one standard rifle in use throughout the United States, instead of the collection of ancient and moderns now in vogue. Coast defense by the militia and camping grounds are also contemplated in this important measure.

D. A. Chisholm, who claims to be a foreman, who occupies a room at the Alpha hotel, got into serious trouble Sunday afternoon. It is stated, as a windup to a prolonged spree.

According to the story, he accused the landlady of robbing him of \$35 and gave her a bad scare by thrusting a pistol before her eyes.

The police were called and when they entered the hall which leads to Chisholm's room they say he shouted:

"The first man that opens that door I'll shoot through the heart."

But this could not daunt the officers and, with "Bill" Shannon in the lead, they made a rush, bursting in the door and soon had the fellow a prisoner.

A search at the station revealed the \$35 which caused all the trouble among Chisholm's other effects.

#### PORTRAYED FAITHFULLY IN DR. WALLACE'S DISCOURSE.

Dr. Wallace was perhaps most effective in his analysis of the character of Lachlan, showing the stern, rough Gaelic shepherd in his old narrow pharisaical character and again with the old prejudice swept away and the old man "as a little child."
