BULL FIGHTS CONDUCTED IN A HUMANE MANNER.

Bull fighting in Portugal is now conducted in a manner so humane that the game is scarcely as exciting as foot ball. In an hour after leaving the ring the disturbed nerves of the bull will have been soothed, and neither he nor any of the fighters will be the worse of the conflict.

It's all because the bull's horns are encased in "boxing gloves" and the fighters must use nothing more formidable than wooden spears. Consequently, the bull is never killed, and rarely wounded. The horns of the bull are cased in stout leather from the roots to the tips, and each sheath ends in a padded ball, which can inflict a blow but cannot by any possibility gore horses or riders.

The fighters are not professionals. Any gentleman who is a good horseman may be selected for an exhibition.

Wants Plaintiff to Secure Costs.
