

POLICE RAIDS CASE HEGRIRA OF OUTLAWS

Recent night raids by Sergeant John Sullivan and the police on downtown lodging houses and the obvious interference by these officials with women living in the red light district are said to be responsible for a hegrira of the outlaw classes to the furnished room houses on Sprague avenue.

So pronounced has been this removal from the vicinity of Front avenue and Howard and Stevens streets that Sprague avenue is rapidly getting the reputation for housing more of these people than the burr district. Many of the women ply their trade in the downtown section have their permanent headquarters in Sprague avenue lodging houses.

Recently a reporter for The Press, accompanied by a detective, visited the Sprague avenue neighborhood in search of a witness wanted in a criminal case. In three different lodging houses between Monroe street and Mill street on Sprague avenue it developed that the tenants—and there were a number in each—lodging house—were women identified with the life of the tenderloin. In each of these houses it was stated the woman wanted had been known by different names in the different houses, but that it was difficult to locate her because the women change their names every few days to suit their convenience. It was found that at least four other lodging houses in this strip of territory were furnishing accommodation for these women and their male friends.

Proof of these conditions was furnished on lower Howard street, where it was ascertained that Sergeant Sullivan ousted the inmates late at night

MANY HARVEST HANDS GATHER AT PENDLETON

PENDLETON, Ore., July 2.—Harvest hands are beginning to gather here. Sheep shearers are returning from the Montana corral; loggers, whose work is being interrupted by low water, the expert harvester men and the idle men from everywhere are flocking into Pendleton preparatory to harvesting the crop of the Inland Empire. Starting here, the small army works north into central and northern Washington, following the season, and the work will last two months.

The extensive use of the combined harvester has reduced the number of harvest hands fully one-half. One of these, operated by five men, does the work formerly done by 20. One driver handles from 26 to 30 horses, a header man attends to the header part of the machine, a sack sewer and a flinger handle the threshed grain and a separator keeps the machine in order. The crew, five men, mow, thresh and sack the grain on 30 acres a day.

Harvest wages start off better this year than last year. Drivers will receive from \$3 to \$3.50; head tenders, \$2 and \$2.50; separator tender, \$4; sack sewer, \$2.50 and \$3; "flingers," \$2 and \$2.50. The crew men, cooks and unskilled labor are being paid the usual rates.

KING PETER CARRIES BOMBS IN HIS POCKETS

BELGRADE, Serbia, July 2.—One of the first government acts of the new king was to remove his name from the list of persons billed to be executed the moment they are caught. He had been on the list since 1868 and had to be very careful not to enter the Serbian army. The king was pleased to restore to himself his real estate confiscated by Milan, among other parcels several Belgrade houses.

Lexington, Ky.—In order to protect his property the court has declared General Cassius M. Clay to be of unbalanced mind and has sent him to an asylum.

Walla Walla, Wash.—Senator Ankeny announces a competitive examination for cadetship at West Point. The examination will be held next Monday at Whitman college.

Washington.—Inspector George Linn of Spokane is here, one of 30 postoffice inspectors called in to testify in the investigation of alleged irregularities in the postal service.

Seattle.—The New York "Marblehead and Bannock" comprising the Pacific squadron of the United States navy, have sailed from Bremerton for Dutch Harbor, Admiral Gates in command.

Washington.—Joseph W. Pope, representing the Canadian Alaska boundary commissioners, is here to examine the originals of some of the charts presented by the American side of the controversy.

New York.—Cardinal Gibbons sails today on La Touraine. He is the head of the hierarchy in America and a member of the Sacred college at Rome, which will elect a successor to Pope Leo.

Tacoma.—The largest log ever floated on Puget sound was towed from Skagit county to the box factory here. It is a spruce, 40 feet long, 9 feet in diameter at one end and 14 at the other, scaling 21,000 feet.

Seattle.—Gold has been found near the mouth of the White river in almost as large quantities as on the banks of Nome. The new beach is 100 miles south of Copper river and \$200 in placer gold was taken out by one man in 11 days.

Wagner, Idaho.—Justice of the Peace Kelly has been arrested on a warrant issued by Justice of the Peace Parsons, charging the former with allowing a prisoner to escape. Parsons says that Kelly will go to jail if he does not furnish bonds and Kelly says that if Parsons holds him in jail he will go to jail. Parsons says that Kelly released a woman prisoner without authority.

Grand Forks, N. D.—The entire family of Joseph Reenwood at Grand Forks was chloroformed and robbed of \$3000 in gold. No clues.

La Crosse, Wis.—William Beebe and Mrs. Ruby Samples were tarred and feathered by a crowd of indignant citizens of Hokah, who later made the city run a gauntlet of jeers and threats until they were driven out of the town. Gross immorality is charged.

St. Louis, Mo.—Before the boddy investigation testimony has been given to the effect that a senatorship in the legislature has been worth \$4000. In legislative circles boddy is known as "dirtwood," as much of it came down the river from Kansas City.

Biton, Idaho.—William Price, charged with the murder of his 2-year-old daughter, is having his preliminary examination. Edward Leech, who tried to shield the child and its mother from the attack and was himself injured by the infuriated father and husband, told his version of the affair.

Ottawa, Ont.—The proposed iron and steel boules include \$8 a ton on iron rods and \$3 a ton on large steel plates and structural steel. The reduction in price on iron bars and pipes will remain as last year. A bounty on binding twine equals the export duty in the Philippines on Manila hemp.

Manila, P. I.—The opium bill, the object of which is to grant a concession for the sale of opium by one party in the Philippine archipelago, was argued for six hours between the Chinese board of trade and representatives of the Evangelical union. A three-year concession is proposed to be let to the highest bidder for a term of five years.

Boise, Idaho.—George Gumbert, democratic candidate for councilman, has obtained an order to show cause why candidates nominated by the democrats and union labor party men should not be placed under their party column. This is an attack on last session's anti-censor law, which prohibits the name of a candidate appearing in more than one place on the official ballot.

Spokane Amateur Athletic club directors last night let the contract for the erection of the new clubhouse to Fred Phair for \$28,120. Work on the building will be commenced next week.
