

VIENNA, March 31.—Emperor Franz Josef today in accordance with a time-honored custom of the emperors of the house of Hapsburg washed the feet of 12 beggars. Twelve aged paupers were

EIGHT YEARS FOR THEFT OF A TYPEWRITER

IS SECOND OFFENSE OF WILLIAM ROYCE AND JUDGE KENNAN THINKS ACCUSED HAS NOT PROFITED BY FORMER EXPERIENCES AND THE LENIENCY THEN SHOWN HIM.

"It is the sentence of this court that you be imprisoned in the state penitentiary at Walla Walla at hard labor for a period of eight years," said Judge Kennan this morning when sentencing William Royce for stealing a typewriter from the house of Pearl McFarland.

Attorney Robertson had made a strong plea for leniency, showing the youth of the defendant, the character of the evidence and other facts in his favor, but the court decided from the record of Royce that he was not entitled to any mercy.

Verdict Is Warranted.

Before passing sentence Judge Kennan said that he thought the defendant had had a fair trial, that he had a good jury and that the evidence warranted the verdict. He also said that the facts that Royce had already served one term in the penitentiary for burglary and had since his release shown no inclination to

profit by the lesson did not warrant leniency.

Leniency, it is said, was shown Royce on his first offense and he was given a light sentence of one year. Since his release he has done little or no work.
