

# GRAIN FARMERS SUCCESSFULLY BE SHIPPERS

"I hope the farmers will make their club go," said a prominent milling man yesterday, referring to the efforts of the Lincoln county club of farmers which intends to organize the eastern Washington farmers to handle their own grain.

"If they go at it right and work for the best interests of their company, they can make a success of it, but I am afraid they overestimate the profit there is in the wheat business. They say all of the warehouses in this section are consolidated and in a trust. Why is it then that there are seven warehouses at Ritzville? If the various companies were in a combine they would not go to the expense of maintaining so many warehouses at one station.

"There is a great deal of competition between the different companies. They are continually offering the farmer inducements to bring his grain to them. The Seattle Grain company is today selling hundreds of thousands of sacks at 5 1/2 cents apiece. If the farmers' company can do this, it will be a good one, because the sacks are selling at 6 cents around here and are worth 5 1/2 cents at Portland.

**Prices Are Just.**

"So you see it is a battle between the different companies. The farmers say we set the price arbitrarily. We do not; but, instead, we pay the Tacoma and Portland prices. We have to keep the price up if we desire the grain. At Ritzville there is a farmers' company that is a real success and it compels us fellows to keep the price 'jiggered up' to the top notch. They run that warehouse on a business line and the farmers all stand together.

"If one of the other warehouse proprietors there attempts to get the trade by offering more than the market price the farmers belonging to the company are instructed to take their grain to him, but as soon as he brings his price down to the level of the others they return to their own warehouse.

"The trouble with farmers is they are too prosperous now. When wheat is down to 40 cents a bushel you never hear them kicking, but just let them get a little money in the bank and they begin to feel that they are being bilked. They then pool their interests and at the same time damn the trusts.

**No Big Profits.**

"They imagine there is a big profit in the wheat business. Well, we don't go into it for the pleasure of it, but more than one company has gone to the wall lately. The business must be figured very closely and there are many chances to make blunders that may result fatally.

"Another trouble with the companies managed by the farmers is that they will not all stand by the company, but will take their wheat to the company offering the highest price. It is generally the case, too, that after a short time the control of the company is assumed by one or two men, who are practically the company and run it to suit themselves. This is true of the company in which a number of farmers around Davenport are interested.

**Will Ensure Top Prices.**

"If the farmers can make the company go, it will do no harm and will insure them the top prices at all times if they stick together.

"Just another word about prices. I doubt if there is one farmer in ten who can figure out what he should receive for his wheat on the basis of the Liverpool quotations. Liverpool prices are based on the long ton. I'll wager, too, that not many of the farmers realize that the companies are giving more for bluestem now than would be paid in Liverpool. This is because this year is not an export year owing to the war and because the local demand for flour made from bluestem is high.

"What made the farmers think they were being robbed was the fact that wheat has been shipped from Minneapolis to the orient cheaper than it could be shipped from Minneapolis to the coast. That is not the fault of the big companies. The railroads are responsible."

# BYRNE IS TRIUMPHANT

The Tolman-Turner-Spokesman-Review combination seems to have completely surrendered to the Byrne aggregation of boxer democrats in Spokane county. A compromise was effected last night which Dr. Turner and Spokesman laughingly say was a compromise in name only, that in fact it was an absorption of the Tolman-Spokesman-Review faction of the Jeffersonian club in which the Byrne people secured a good deal more from the silk stocking wing than they ever had asked for in any of their plans.

The boxes further say that the Tolman for governor is at an end and that he will now make an attempt to secure the nomination for superior judge and will leave Spokane county to declare for Byrne for governor.

Mr. Tolman is out of the city, and whether he is a party to the arrangement or whether it is only the work of kind friends will not be known until his return today or tomorrow.

**Turner is Cautious.**

Senator Turner has requested his friends to quit their fight upon Byrne for fear it will endanger his hold upon the party and it was this suggestion which first prompted the "compromise" which finally was perfected last night.

A meeting was held last night in the office of Turner & Gorightly and the settlement was made. The Byrne men originally only asked for the selection of Del Cary Smith for president. This was bitterly contested last Saturday night and the club in consequence broke in two. The Byrne men last night not only were conceded the presidency but a large share of the other offices. Mr. Maloney, the president of the anti-Byrne wing, will step down and out at the first meeting, which will be next Saturday evening, and Smith will take the chair. The other officers agreed upon last night are: A. C. Edmonds, vice president, and M. H. Eggleston, treasurer and on executive committee, consisting of J. M. Jamieson, J. J. Sullivan, Captain John Gray, Dr. J. F. Reddy, Dr. D. C. Newman, August Hise, C. C. Dempsey, Julius Zittel, J. M. Garaghty, H. D. Merritt, J. J. Maloney, Leonard Funk, John Condron, F. J. Marvin and E. F. Quinn.

**HEINZE WINS**

"The election in Butte," said Frank Walker, an old resident of that city, "means a complete victory for the Heinze forces."

"The campaign has been one between the anti-trust and labor forces against the trust forces backed by the Amalgamated Copper company.
