GIRL-BOY TRAMP IS CAPTURED IN BUTTE

BUTTE, Mont., May 31.—Has Jennie Morrison, now under arrest at the police station, who claims to have masqueraded in boys' clothes for five years, succeeding in concealing her identity from her hobo acquaintances of box-cars and head-beaters. This is the first thought that strikes the observer on seeing the little girl in the cell of the city jail.

"I've hoboed from Portland to Boston and down south to New Orleans and into Old Mexico and no one ever told me to my makeup till I hit this camp," said the girl. "You see, I've got a peculiar voice and no one would take me to be a girl. It's a girl's voice that gives her away when they try to do the man stunt."

Jennie Morrison smiled as she talked and interspersed enough profanity into her conversation to make it in keeping with her surroundings. Pity for the little girl whose curly hair and full rosy cheeks still suggest baby outlines seems to be unnecessary and uncalculated. The authorities captured the girl and her companion, Ed Grant, several days ago as they were about to climb onto the rods of an out-going Northern Pacific train. The girl fell in the attempt and the cry attracted an officer. The voice was unmistakably that of a girl and thus Jennie Morrison's identity was revealed.

Girl Must Love Someone. "My folks live in Portland," said the girl, "but I want to see the world. Me and Ed have gone everywhere, that is, everywhere I want to go, and he follows me. I started wearing boys' clothes six years ago in Portland, and I got stuck on the game and have worn them ever since. You see, I could sell papers and go places no girl could go, so I just kept it up. Ed is a Portland boy and he ain't an criminal either. He's been good to me and well, a girl will love anyone that's good to her—sometimes. Won't they, now?"

"When I got out I'm going to wear boys' clothes again and stay by Ed, and I always will. I hate skirts and all that fool stuff women wear. These church women who called on me were right. They mean right, but—Lord—they don't know anything. What does anyone know who hasn't traveled and knocked about the world." There was a boastful ring in her words.

Wise Little Girl. "Ed wants me to marry him," she said, with childish earnestness, "but I'm afraid he wouldn't be as good to me if we were married. He might not want me to ramble around the world as I'm doing now. Travel—that's the thing. That's the only kind of life worth living. My mother? Well, she don't know where I am and what she don't know where I hurt her. She runs two boarding houses in Portland and has money enough to keep me right if I wanted to live that way." Jennie Morrison is a study. Pretty, ton-boysish and decidedly clever. Just why she is what she is, is hard to discover. Without regret for the past, hope for the present, or fear for the future, Jennie Morrison, the strange boy-girl waits her fate in the city jail with the most hardened of criminals, as though the matter was an everyday occurrence.
