
THE BIRTH OF OLD GLORY

BRAVE WEARERS OF THE GRAY TO MEET AGAIN


NASHVILLE, Tenn., June 14.—From 15,000 to 18,000 confederate veterans are gathered in Nashville today for their 14th annual reunion.
